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REQUEST: How much does the proposed budget include for ongoing funds for workforce development and how does that compare to last year's allocation for ongoing funds? How much did the City allocate to workforce development in one-time funds last year, and how does that compare to this year?

RESPONSE:

Economic Development Department

The FY 2023-24 proposed budget will continue funding \$3.1 million for workforce development, long-term job training, and wraparound services to create new pathways to good jobs and well-paying careers for all residents. Another \$150,000 from the Economic Incentives Reserve Fund will be provided in FY 2023-24. These contracts will reach their contract terms by October 2024. EDD plans to offer extensions or open a competitive process (solicitation) as necessary depending on contract performance at end of term. In FY 2022-23, six providers received the funding as shown in the table below:

Telecommunication and Regulatory Affairs

Parks and Recreation

In FY2023, \$288,150 in ongoing funds were allocated to deliver PARD workforce development programs. Additionally, PARD is expected to spend \$1.3 million in one-time funds for the Austin Civilian Conservation Corp. (ACCC) workforce development program. The one-time funds are allocated from ARPA Grant Funds and Budget Stabilization Reserve Fund.

In FY2024 \$324,807 in ongoing funds has been allocated in Parks and Recreation Department's (PARD) proposed budget for workforce development programs. In FY2024 it is expected that \$2.8 million in rollover one-time funding for the ACCC program will be available in FY2024 to support ACCC workforce development programs. Any funds not spent in FY24 are expected to roll over to the FY25. Proposed Budget.
