SUBTRCT.	MWBE Participation – Austin Energy's Weatherization Program Solicitations

I am pleased to inform the Committee of the success of our initiatives in training and recruiting Minority and Women Contractors for the three solicitations for performing the work necessary for the Weatherization Assistance Program. The Program is funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act ("ARRA" or "Stimulus Act") through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs ("TDHCA") in the amount of \$5.8 million over two years. The Austin City Council has previously approved acceptance of the first \$2.9 million and the execution of a cooperative agreement with Travis County.

Austin Energy has previously weatherized over 14,000 households in Austin through its in-house program. The Stimulus Act created an unprecedented opportunity to obtain federal funds to administer an enhanced Weatherization Assistance Program. After successful application to the TDHCA and the Department of Energy, in 2009 Austin Energy became the only municipal electric utility in the nation authorized to administer a federally-funded weatherization program.

Twenty-six MBE/WBE firms successful completed the Digital Workforce Academy Weatherization 101 training. Completing the training allowed them to receive the additional required certification to enter into contracts for weatherization work funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. Austin Energy Director of Business Development, Jan Lawson, created three opportunities for completing this training. In addition, Ms. Lawson recruited participants through the Austin Black Contractors Association, U.S. Hispanic Contractors Association de Austin, and Asian Contractor Association.

We made the decision to extend the bid closing for all three solicitations from March 9 to March 16 in order to maximize opportunities for MBE/WBE firms both subcontractors and primes. All of the MBE certified firms who are utilized as subcontractors on the six approved awardees' compliance plans were participants in the Weatherization training program. The one proposed awardee that is a certified MBE Prime Contractor, Valdez Remodeling, was also a participant in the training.

The pre-bid conference successfully attracted a majority of the bidders in the Test-In, Test-Out, and Weatherization Services categories. Thirteen of twenty bidders in the Test-In and Test-Out categories attended the optional pre-bid conference. (Six of the twenty bids were deemed incomplete when reviewed.)

Eight of the ten bidders for Weatherization Services attended the pre-bid conference. (Three of the ten bids were deemed incomplete when reviewed.)

Seven of the nine recommended awardees for Test-In and seven of the nine recommended awardees for Test-Out attended the pre-bid conference. All of the recommended awardees for Weatherization Services attended the pre-bid conference.

No MBE/WBE goals were set for the Test-In and Test-Out solicitations due to the lack of subcontracting opportunities. Participation goals of 14% MBE and 2% WBE were set for the Weatherization Services solicitation. The recommended firms provided MBE/WBE Compliance Plans that met the goals of the solicitation and have been approved by the Small and Minority Business Resources Department. Further detail about the participating firms is attached as part of the Request for Council Action for Weatherization Services contracts.

We continue to develop additional training programs to address work specialties where there is limited or no M/WBE availability to perform energy efficiency services required under the Program. We are considering issuing a supplemental solicitation, possibly the end of summer 2010, to support work in the second year of the grant period to further leverage our success with training and recruiting minority contractors.

There will be three items for Council's consideration on April 8, 2010. The three Request for Council Action's (RCAs), with evaluations matrices and other information, are attached. Also attached is a chronology that shows the timeline of outreach initiatives to the community and contractors and other key activities in the Program, and a summary of economic impacts and other important aspects of the Program.

As you know, the Weatherization Assistance Program is operating under severe time requirements imposed by the Department of Energy and the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. The TDHCA Director personally spoke with the Mayor and City Manager by telephone on March 3, 2010 in order to express his concern about Austin Energy meeting its goals. He informed the Mayor and City Manager that TDHCA would soon be adopting a rule to facilitate de-obligation of grant funds for failure to perform. In light of this funding pressure, we've developed a production schedule to ensure that we are not faced with "de-obligation". As long as things progress as we anticipate, we're confident that we can spend the funds as planned.

Compliance Oversight:

Austin Energy will provide initial compliance/oversight in the ARRA funded Weatherization program. The following steps will be taken to assure compliance:

- All potential clients will be verified regarding income qualification
- All potential dwellings will first be reviewed by AE WAP staff
- At least 10% of all initial assessments conducted by contracted vendors will be reviewed or conducted under the direction of AE WAP staff
- At least 10% of all dwellings assigned to vendors performing weatherization services will be inspected during work in progress
- At least 10% of all final inspections of completed works will be reviewed or conducted under the direction of AE WAP staff
- All invoices will be reviewed and approved prior to submission for payment

Austin Energy will have two full time WAP staff members committed to providing oversight to all aspects of the field work conducted under the ARRA funded WAP.

In addition Austin Energy will have two full time staff to review all applications and final invoices related to ARRA funded Weatherization services.

The Program Coordinator will provide oversight to the four WAP staff members and conduct quality assurance reviews on an ongoing basis.

This contract is for the purchase of home energy performance audits for 500 homes annually for two years. The audit determines the appropriate building tightness levels, carbon monoxide levels, comprehensive air infiltration levels and ensures that all approved weatherization measures/improvements identified by the National Energy Audit (NEAT) and the Manufactured Home Energy Audit (MHEA) systems are detailed and documented as prescribed within the solicitation.

The "Test-In" energy audit assessment performed on each home pre-determines the energy efficient measures that can be performed and are cost-effective by ensuring that the discounted savings-to-investment ratio (SIR) is greater than or equal to one. The energy audit assessment will establish the priority of weatherization measures necessary to increase the energy efficiency level of a particular home.

This federal grant is for \$5,800,000 for the 24 month grant period. On November 19, 2009, Council approved the acceptance of \$2,900,000 of grant funds for the 2009-2010 fiscal year from the Department of Energy (DOE) through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) as a result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) to weatherize homes for low income, elderly, and disabled customers within Austin Energy's service area. Austin Energy will bring to Council a request for the acceptance of the \$2,900,000 for the second year of grant funding for the 2010-2011 budget. Council also approved an Interlocal Agreement between the City of Austin/Austin Energy and Travis County allowing the sharing of



The National Energy Audit (NEAT) and the Manufactured Home Energy Audit (MHEA) systems will recommend weatherization retrofit measures/improvements tailored to a particular home by determining the appropriate building tightness levels, carbon monoxide levels, and comprehensive air infiltration levels and ensures that all approved weatherization measures/improvements identified by the National Energy Audit (NEAT) and the Manufactured Home Energy Audit (MHEA) systems are completed as identified within the solicitation.

The weatherization measures/improvements performed on each home will maintain and improve energy efficiencies that can be shown are cost-effective by ensuring that the discounted savings-to-investment ratio (SIR) is greater than or equal to one. Amount and Source of Funding: Funding is available from the Department of Energy (DOE) through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) as a result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009 for the grant period of October 1, 2009 to August 31, 2011. No match is required.

Prior Council Action: November 19, 2009 – Approved acceptance of \$2,900,000 grant from DOE amending the budget and approved related Interlocal Agreement with Travis County

This contract is for the purchase of home energy performance final inspection audits for 500 homes annually for two years. The inspections will verify that the appropriate building tightness levels, carbon monoxide levels, and comprehensive air infiltration levels were attained as determined by the National Energy Audit (NEAT) and the Manufactured Home Energy Audit (MHEA) systems and all work has been completed to standards identified within the solicitation.

The "Test-Out" energy audit assessment performed on each home determines that the approved weatherization construction measures/improvements have been completed correctly and ensure that a savings-to-investment ratio (SIR) greater than or equal to one is achieved.

This federal grant is for \$5,800,000 for the 24 month grant period. On November 19, 2009, Council approved the acceptance of \$2,900,000 of grant funds for the 2009-2010 fiscal year from the Department of Energy (DOE) through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) as a result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) to weatherize homes for low income, elderly, and disabled customers within Austin Energy's service area. Austin Energy will bring to Council a request for the acceptance of the \$2,900,000 for the second year of grant funding for the 2010-2011 budget. Council also approved an Interlocal Agreement between the City of Austin/Austin Energy and Travis County allowing the sharing of expertise and resources including those provided by these contractors.

Additional Backup Material (click to open) D MATRIX This Federal Weatherization Assistance Program complements Austin Energy's existing Free Home Energy Improvement program which is on-going. The goals of both programs are to increase the energy efficiency of the home, increase the comfort level of the homes inhabitants, reduce energy consumption, lower utility bills, and improve the health and safety of residents.

A team of Austin Energy and Travis County employees with expertise in weatherization and testing scored the qualifications based on staff experience, number of assessments performed, testing experience and training, certifications and licenses. The team unanimously chose the nine eight from those submitted as the best qualified firms.
