Process under way to name Central Austin neighborhood Park

The City of Austin begins today the naming process for a Central Austin neighborhood park adjacent to Zilker Elementary School.

The 4.57-acre property at 1900 Bluebonnet Lane includes a softball field, tennis courts, a playground, picnic tables and a quarter-mile trail. Today's announcement begins a 90-day period for public discussion about possible names for the park.

The facilities naming ordinance allows the parkland to be named after an individual(s) (living or dead) or something other than an individual such as a place or natural feature. A suggestion for naming a facility must include:

- · If an individual A biographical sketch; a description of the individual's involvement in the community; and the individual's connection if any, to the Austin park system.
- · If other than an individual, include justification for the suggested name.

Deadline for submissions is June 28, 2010. After the deadline, the Parks Board will call a public hearing on the suggested names and make recommendations to the City Council for final approval. Nomination forms are available at the Parks and Recreation Department's Main Office, 200 S. Lamar Blvd.; by calling (512) 974-6716; or online at www.cityofaustin.org/parks/namingform.htm.

Background

Zilker Neighborhood Park, which is smaller than 5 acres, is directly adjacent to Zilker Elementary and it is very close to the larger Zilker Park that most Austinites know. Friends of Zilker Neighborhood Park (FZNP) seek a more distinctive name that would give the park an identity that is separate from both the school and the big Zilker Park. Renaming the park would help with some branding issues as many people assume it is part of the school campus. Further, a distinctive name can assist in boosting fundraising efforts.

The Process

FZNP first checked with the city's Parks and Recreation Department (PARD) about the possibility of renaming the park. It was confirmed that the name was taken from the elementary school and not for a person who donated land for the school. Therefore, we could proceed with the process. We settled on a process whereby our committee would submit the most popular finalist names to the PARD as opposed to narrowing the

recommendations to just one name. In the fall of 2009, we vetted this process with PARD chair, Linda Guerrero and she agreed that this process would be fine.

In May, we requested submissions for new names from the community and school through our neighborhood listserv (more than 500 members), neighborhood quarterly newsletter (delivered to all Zilker residents) and meeting and the Zilker Elementary PTA newsletter. We received more than 50 submissions.

In August, a committee comprising several volunteers representing the neighborhood and school, held a meeting and narrowed the field to two names based on guiding principles established prior to the meeting. Further, we developed a list of important community members (whose names were submitted) whom we will suggest recognizing by naming features of the park in their honor (for example: Doug Sahm Hill at Butler Park).

We hope to keep the community apprised of any PARD meeting dates related to the park renaming timeline so that everyone can be part of the process.

And the Finalists Are...

The two names that the FZNP committee is forwarding to the PARD board are Bluebonnet Park and Little Zilker Park. Both of these names were highly favored by the community. Bluebonnet Park was selected mostly because the park is on Bluebonnet Lane. Several people recalled bluebonnets growing in the park and indeed, there are bluebonnets growing now. There are no other Bluebonnet Parks in the city. Little Zilker Park is a name that some people in the neighborhood and school community already use to distinguish the park from the larger Zilker Park. Several people pointed out that there is a Little Stacy Park and Big Stacy Park in Travis Heights.

Further, the following people, whose names were submitted, merit special recognition in some meaningful way, which can be addressed in the years to come:

Joy and Andy Alexander—longtime Zilker neighbors and volunteers
Conrad and Shudde Fath—longtime Zilker neighbors and volunteers
A.D. Stegner—built several notable mid-century Zilker homes
Stevie Ray Vaughan—famous Texas musician who lived in Zilker and had many ties here, including family members and friends
Danny Roy Young—Zilker resident, beloved Austin restaurateur and musician
The Robinson Family—A longtime Zilker family with many historical ties, such as land ownership as well as having ancestors buried in Barton Springs Cemetery on Goodrich.
