### **Noteworthy Ordinance Changes**

New Ordinance Adopted May 2009 Rules Adopted May 2010

- ■180 day vs. 60 day application submittal
- •Affected persons required to <u>submit</u> <u>their disapproval</u> vs. affected persons required to submit their approval
- Director has authority to modify routes
- Applicant who violates terms of permit can be prohibited from applying for additional closure permits for 24 months



Neighborhood associations can force an event to seek City Council approval





# **Event Disapprovals from Citizens**

Disapprovals/feedback are considered in following year's approval process.

- 16 events received at least 1 disapproval
- No Neighborhood Association sent back a disapproval
- Received post event disapprovals or negative feedback for:

Austin Marathon (multiple from 46th street)

Texas Round up (3 citizen complaints - access issues)

Art City (1 downtown business owner – access issue)

Congress Avenue Mile (1 DT business owner- access issue)

#### **UTC Actions**

UTC receives briefings on issues with street events; votes on appeals to denied applications; votes on event disapprovals that meet the 20% threshold.



# **Special Event Successes**



- Weekly meetings with cross-departmental stakeholders to review upcoming events
- New web site with updated event maps
- Office of Special Events Manager hired
- Increased public notification/ media communication
- Created Special Event parking signs for SXSW to ease load in/load out parking issues and costs of implementation

### **Special Events: Lessons Learned**

- Congress Avenue Crossing 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> is highly desirable event route; downtown is most desired event location
- Event notification to affected persons needs improvement; better data; electronic options
- Late applications disrupt timely notification process, continues with no consequences
- Conflicts with other events <u>increasing</u> for right-of-way use, day use permits, park events, other venues, and construction activities

### Ord. Review/Potential Changes

- Need scalable process for small events, block parties, parades, safety closures and sidewalk events
- Need definition for political/freedom of speech parades, walks vs. regular parades walks to build awareness
- Need real consequences for late applications
- Possible recovery of lost revenue for parking spaces
- Need better clarification on rights/privileges allowed to grandfathered events
- Review price/consistency for renting parkland vs. closing a city street or bridge for festivals
- Spillover impacts other large events

# Office of Special Events Initiatives

- Update Application: more detailed information at intake (in progress)
- Update Special Events Web Site to include more comprehensive information (in progress)



Departmental coordination with construction permitting to identify conflicts (in progress)

Cross-Departmental coordination to include Temporary Change of Use Permits (in progress)

# Office of Special Events Initiatives

- Survey and/or focus groups with event planners, neighborhoods, churches, residences (planned activity)
- Utilize 3-1-1 as comment clearinghouse to capture comments about pre- and post -events



2012 – Office of Special Events will be its own division separate from Right of Way Management

# **Next Steps**

- Initiate ordinance amendments for UTC and Council review and approval
- Survey best practices for special event/right-of-way management in other cities
- Enhance collaborative working relationship with other City departments
