THE DOWNTOWN AUSTIN PLAN: WHY?


COUNCIL RESOLUTION 20051215-056 (Dec. 15, 2005):

- Directed City Manager to initiate Downtown Austin Plan.
- Established Plan boundaries.
- Directed the Plan to address certain issues, including:
 - Ordinance modernizations, including FAR and height standards.
 - Recommendations for the possible sale and redevelopment of government-owned land.
 - Recommendations on rail alignments.
 - Recommendations on affordable work force housing.

COUNCIL RESOLUTION 20080605-046 (June 5, 2008):


 Directed that the Downtown Austin Plan should include a Downtown Parks and Open Space Master Plan

A transportation system that's convenient, sustainable, affordable, and a viable alternative to the automobile.




HISTORIC:

DIVERSE AND INCLUSIVE:


Welcoming – with a wide range of choices – for individuals and families with diverse social and economic backgrounds.

Parks and Recreation Board Regular Meeting May 25, 2010



PRIORITY INVESTMENTS = \$250M to \$350M



TEN-YEAR PRIORITY PROGRAM (2012 – 2021)

PARKS: \$57 to \$77 million

1. Increase PARD's annual O&M budget; Develop Furnishing/Signage Master Plan; Create Downtown Parks project manager role. (\$900k to \$1.2m per year)

- Plan, Design and Implement Signature Parks:
 - Waller Creek (\$31m to \$42m)
 - Palm Park (\$6m to \$8m)
 - Waterloo Park (\$7 to \$10m)
 - Brush Square (\$3 to \$4m)
- 3. Prepare long-term plan/design for:
 - Wooldridge Square (\$500k to \$700k)
 - Old Bakery (\$100k to \$200k)
