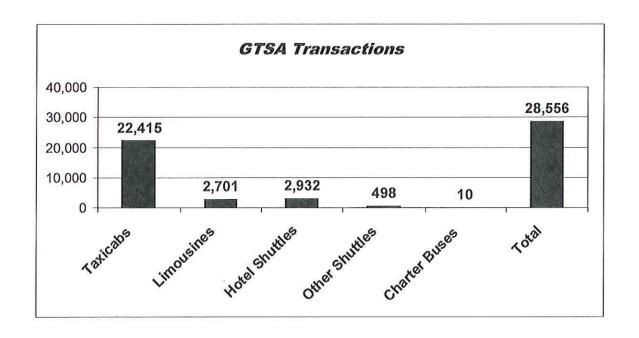

The price offered through the cooperatives had a cost savings of \$164,948 over the best-value bids received. Tires purchased from this contract will be purchased from the local vendors who are on the cooperative contracts.

Utilizing the TXMAS cooperative contracts provide for volume discount pricing and they provide the flexibility to purchase a wider variety of tires that meet the needs of the City's diverse fleet.

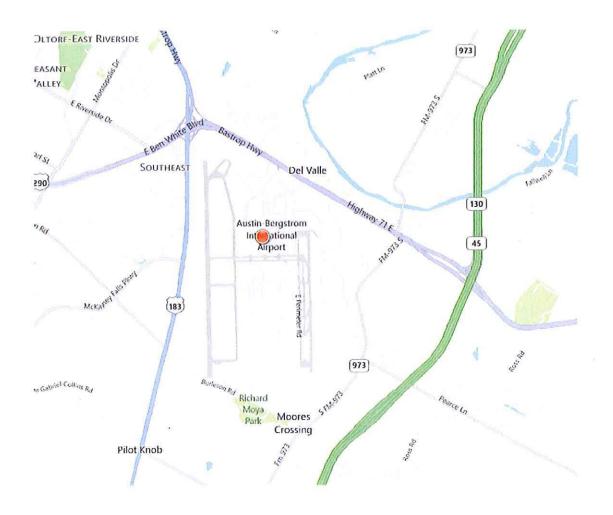

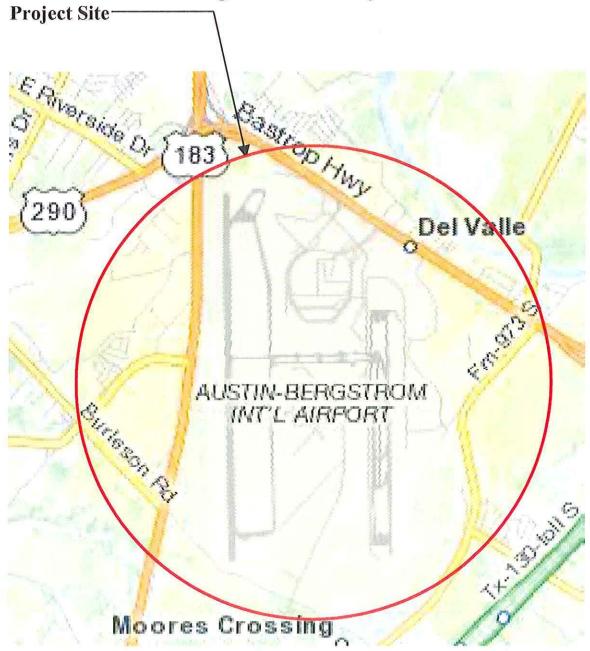

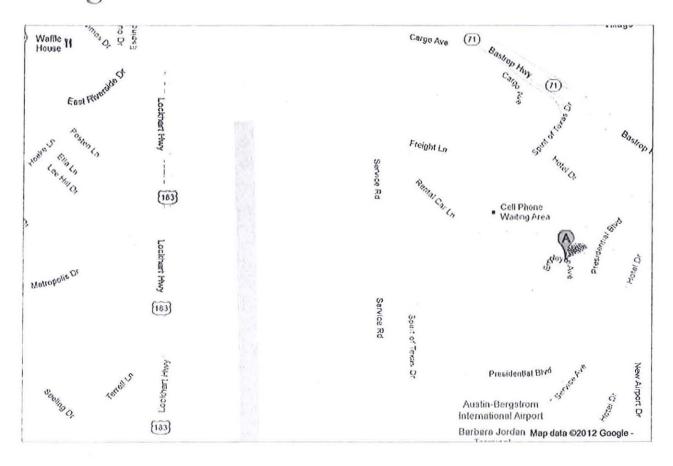
