DT FRIEND CHARLIE WUKASCH DIES AT HOME; RITES PENDING

Charles George Wukasch, 79, pioneer Austin businessman and lifelong friend of the University of Texas, died at his home at 611 West 23rd Street early Tuesday. Funeral arrangements will be announced by Rhythmic-Memor Funeral Home.

Known throughout the state to the thousands who attended the University in the first quarter of the century, Wukasch had operated an eating establishment—Charlie's Confectionery—near the campus from 1902 until 1939.

born in Lee County Jan. 29, 1873, he was orphaned at an early age and was reared by relatives.

He enlisted in the US Army when war was declared on Spain and served throughout the war with Troop G of the First Texas Volunteers.

Wukasch came to Austin in 1898 and worked for several years for the late Henry Masarik, who had one of the first bakeries in Austin, before going into business for himself.

The original Charlie's Confectionery was opened at 24th and Guadalupe in 1902 but was moved to 23rd and Guadalupe in 1904.

It was the first eating establishment near the campus and the third business to be opened in that area.

More than a business, Charlie's Confectionery was study hall, meeting place and social center for University students of that era.

Wukasch knew most of the students who attended from 1902 until 1939 and some of them were able to complete their educations through his indirect aid. For a number of outstanding graduates today once worked as extra help at Charlie's.

Active in many financial campaigns to benefit the University, Wukasch helped solicit funds for the construction of Memorial Stadium, Gregory Gymnasium, the Union Building and other expansion work.

He himself had only a third grade education—but he lived to

see all three of his children receive degrees from UT. His daughter Edna, now Mrs. E. A. Swiedom of Davenport, Iowa, was the first woman to receive a degree from the University's engineering school. This was in 1925. His son, Walter, now operator of Charlie's Liquor Stores, received a BBA degree in 1929, and his other son, Martin, now senior engineer of the industrial hygiene section of the State Department of Health, received a chemical engineering degree in 1941.

In 1929, Wukasch stepped down as manager of Charlie's but remained active in the business until his son, Walter, who has succeeded him as manager, opened another business.

Wukasch was married to Miss Emma Helen Hannusch in Winchester on Aug. 10, 1903, and the couple had celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last summer.

The 611 West 23rd Street address had been their home since 1917.

Since Wukasch's retirement from business, his interests had centered around watching the development of the University — which had boasted only one building when he first located on the drag — and participating in church work. In this latter field, he had helped organize Trinity Lutheran Church at 45th and Maybelle in 1940 and had been active in that congregation until his death.

The first Wukasch to migrate to Austin, he was followed by some of his brothers and sisters who also opened businesses of their own.
