1. Welcome and Introduction

2. Findings of Fact Discussion

• Pat Murphy, Environmental Officer, WPDR and Ingrid McDonald, WPDR briefed the Environmental Board members on the Findings of Facts.

3. Rules/Procedures on the Dais

- Discussion was held to brief Board Members on rules and procedures while on the dais.
- Board members discussed the need for a Parliamentarian. There was a consensus to all become more adept at using Robert's Rules, and several members requested updated copies.
- Chair Anderson stated that he will stick to the "three questions rule" when asking information from staff and applicant.

4. How to make motions

• The Board discussed briefly the protocol for making motions on the dais.

5. Proposed Changes to the Land Development Code Impacting the Environment

- Pat Murphy provided the Board with a list of future issues and potential changes to the LDC that might impact environment. They included:
 - 1. The development of a Headwater Protection ordinance;
 - 2. LDC Changes within the Desired Develop Zone, specifically the SH130 Corridor, including:
 - Riparian setbacks
 - Erosion setbacks
 - Flood setbacks
 - Net vs. gross site area impervious cover
 - 3. Alternative water quality standards, including:
 - Green roofs

- 1. Need to impact projects BEFORE they make it to the Board in the form of variance requests. Therefore, we need to help shape policy at the Council level:
- 2. To accomplish 1) above, the Board needs to use a consent agenda more effectively, allowing us to concentrate on the difficult variance cases and policy development;
- 3. Staff should share packet info electronically (i.e., via FTP?);
- 4. Staff should have a checklist to guarantee the completeness of backup information;
- 5. Board needs a manner in which to determine consistency (i.e., Waterfront Overlay);
- 6. The Board needs to focus on the what is under our purview;
- 7. Develop a courtesy review protocol, communicate it, and stick to it; and
- 8. All Board members need to understand and abide by Board Policy

9. Identification of Major Environmental Issues Facing the City of Austin

- The Board discussed the potential major environmental issues facing the City ٠ of Austin in the near future, and proposed ideas on how to address them. They included:
 - 1. SH 130 Development
 - 2. 290 Expansion Oak Hill area
 - 3. SH45 Development
 - 4. Implementation of Envision Central Texas Goals
 - 5. Public Transportation
- Chair Anderson was going to appoint Board Members to determine courses of action on each item.

- Rain water harvesting
- Hidden storage/detention
- New changes to tree rules, including the idea of heritage trees
- 4. Design standards (adopted in January 2007) and the landscape standards (not yet adopted).

- The Board discussed how to be effective in dealing with these changes
 - 1. Develop a Codes & Ordinances Subcommittee (determine from Planning Commission how they operate and when they meet)
 - 2. Use resolutions more effectively to promote good changes to LDC

7. Lessons Learned during the Water Treatment Plan #4 Process

- The Board discussed the lessons learned as a result of the WTP4 process, and what Staff, Council, and Boards and Commissions can do to ensure better products in the future.
 - 1. Use experiences at Ullrich WTP to be better at WTP4;
 - 2. Engage the public early;
 - 3. Ensure that City Staff understand the environmental magnitude of the projects they undertake; several ideas were offered to accomplish this:
 - Environmental Stakeholder in each major city department with the potential to impact environment
 - Allow the City's Environmental Officer to truly act City-wide
 - Develop an Environmental Auditor position
 - 4. Ensure original WTP4 Motion (Holder/Moncada) was agreed to by several parties and hold them to that;
 - 5. Potentially add additional staffing for inspections;
 - 6. The information provided to decision-making bodies and advisory boards should be consistent;
 - 7. City Council information may not be accurate and compared to the private sector; and
 - 8. Allowing Environmental Board to act in executive session might enable the Board to be more effective with real estate issues in the future.
- Chair Anderson discussed future meetings with Assistant City Manager Huffman to discuss these issues
