PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1945 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story wing-and-gable plan rock veneered frame house with a hipped and gabled roof; the projecting front-gabled bay on the façade contains a large plate-glass picture window with 1:1 side windows; all other fenestration on the house is composed of single and paired 1:1 wood-frame windows. The house had a wraparound porch on the left side of the principal façade on rock-veneered columns and a rock-veneered railing with a concrete cap.

RESEARCH


The house was built in 1945 for W.C. (Wilson C. – "Bill") Atkins and his wife, Myrtle. Atkins had worked at Austin Goodyear prior to building this house; he was involved in real estate at the time of construction – both as a real estate agent and then as a contractor. He and Myrtle lived in this house until the mid-1960s, when it was purchased by Raymond and Annie Torres, who moved from another house on Oxford Avenue. Torres had a junk business in the 1960s, and was retired for most of the time that he and Annie lived in this house.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is not listed in any city survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Release the demolition permit after completion of a City of Austin documentation package consisting of photographs of all four elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan of the house, and a narrative history for archiving at the Austin History Center.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

WILSON and MYRTLE ATKINS (ca. 1945 – ca. 1967)

Wilson and Myrtle Atkins (spelled Adkins) appear in the 1940 U.S. Census living at 1702 Briar Street, a house they owned, and which was worth \$1,800. Wilson Adkins was then 27, had been born in Texas, and was the service manager for a tire company, which comports with city directory listings of the 1940s, whowing him working at Austin Goodyear. Myrtle Adkins was then 25, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. The couple had a 3-year old daughter, Jane.

NOTE: Wilson C. and Myrtle Atkins are listed as living at 1505 Newning Avenue;

Wilson C. Atkins appears in the 1930 U.S. Census as the 17-year old son of Pearl Atkins, a widow residing on a farm in rural Williamson County, Texas. Wilson C. Atkins was listed as a farmer on a general farm. His older brother, Dennis, 21, was a laborer performing odd jobs. No one else in the household had an occupation listed. The 1910 U.S. Census shows that Wilson Atkins' mother, Pearl, was living on her parents' Williamson County farm with her husband, C.W. Atkins, who was a laborer who hired out his time.

W.C. "Bill" Atkins, a longtime Austin resident, died Monday, May 20, 1996.

He is survived by his daughters, Joyce Cooper of Austin, Judy Atkins of Georgetown, and Jane Marshall of Austin: grandchildren, Brett Cooper, Wyly Owen, Clif Owen, Rich Marshall, and Misty Marshall; and seven great-grandchildren.

The 1940 U.S. Census report shows Raymond and Anna Torres living at 610 E. 8th Street in Austin, a house they owned, and which was worth \$1,000. Raymond Torres was then 33, had been born in Texas, and is listed as a junk dealer. Anna Torres was then 30, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had three daughters, Gloria, 9, Lucille, 8, and Anna Ruth, 5, as well as Anna Torres' parents, Manuel and Sarah Ramirez. Manuel Ramirez was a junk dealer, and apparently in business with Raymond Torres.
