






IMAGINE AUSTIN (IA) – Growth Concept Map





- Currently all Neighborhood Plan & Specific Regulating District CIP Priorities are mapped.
- Approximately 50% of all CIP Related Neighborhood Plan Recommendations are mapped.
- Maps of recommendations will be integrated into Public Work's project planning and coordination mapping system as a reference layer.

All Small Area Plan Recommendations

- Small Area Plan Priorities are the top projects that planning staff focuses on advocating for.
 - Neighborhood Plans: Work with Neighborhood Plan Contact Teams to identify their top priorities.
 - Survey 1/3 of the Neighborhood Plan Areas annually.
 - Every Neighborhood Plan Area develops new priorities once every 3 years.
 - 2013: Asking for the Top 5 CIP priorities and Top 5 operational priorities for participating plan areas.
 - Specific Regulating Districts: Priorities determined through in-depth planning processes and cross-departmental staff analysis.



City of Austin Sidewalk Master Plan

In order to address traffic congestion, pedestrian safety, and air quality, encourage walking, and in mobility for people with disabilities the City of Austin is upgrading sidewalks as directed by the Aus Council in accordance with the City of Austin Sidewalk Master Plan adopted per Resolution No. 2009030

Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan

On June 15th 2012 the Austin City Council unanimously adopted the Imagine Austin comprehension (http://www.imagineaustin.net). The plan calls for a more vibrant, livable connected Austin; improven the City of Austin sidewalk network are supported by the following Imagine Austin policies:

Chapter 4 Policies

LUT P11. Promote complete street design that includes features such as traffic calming elements, street trees, wide sidewalks, and pedestrian, bicycle, and transit access throughout Austin, considering the safety needs of people of all ages and abilities.

LUT P14. Promote safer routes to schools for students of all ages.

LUT P15. Incorporate provisions for bicycles and pedestrians into all roads such as freeways, toll roads, ar roadways, and to and from transit stations and stops, and major activity centers.

HN P12. Identify and assess the improvements needs or older neighborhoods and provide for improvements needed to maintain their sustainability.

HN P13. Strengthen Austin's neighborhoods by connecting to other neighborhoods, quality schools, parks, environmental features, and other community-serving uses that are accessible by transit, walking, and bicycling.


S P25. Increase sidewalks and bicycle lanes in neighborhoods to create safer routes to schools, parks, and dansit stops.

CONTACT TEAM ACTIONS

- Visit the Grow Local section of the Sustainable Food Center website to view resources and register for classes on starting a community garden. Also visit the Austin Grows section of the City of Austin's website to download the Community Garden Information and Permit Application Packet.
- Conduct outreach in the community to gather support and organize a steering committee for the garden. Local community gardening and food groups around Austin, such as the Sustainable Food Center and the Coalition of Austin Community Gardens, can provide resources to help your committee get started.
- 3) If you are interested in starting your community garden on a piece of property owned by the City of Austin, contact the City's Sustainable Urban Agriculture and Community Gardens (SUACG) Program to create and submit a community garden permit application and obtain a Community Garden License Agreement. As part of this process, groups are encouraged to obtain endorsement for their garden from a local nonprofit organization. Potential partner organizations are listed in the Permit Application Packet.
- Break ground with a work partyl Keep Austin Beautiful has tools and grants available to support the work of your community garden.

UNDERSTANDING THE PROCESS

- Thriving community gardens on City property are a partnership between the community garden group. City departments, and a nonprofit group. The City's SUACG Program will provide support for your group throughout the process of establishing a Community Garden.
- The SUACG Program maintains a list of City of Austin properties screened and identified as potentially available for community garden development. The list is available upon request.
