Subject: Director's Report

### Sustainable Materials Update

Approximately 100 participants attended the Sustainable Materials Management Workshop, hosted by STAR, EPA Region 6, and Austin Resource Recovery on February 25 and 26 in Austin. The event not only was a presentation forum on recycling issues, but it also was the beginning of a partnership to further recycling in Texas. More discussion on recycling measurement and sustainable materials management will continue at the Texas Recycling and Sustainability Summit, which will take place in Houston from October 13-16.

### 2013 State Legislative Bill Review

As part of the implementation of the Austin Zero Waste Strategic Plan, I testified at the state legislature on behalf of two bills:

HB 1473 Author: Rodriguez Position: Support
 This bill establishes the Texas Beverage Container Recycling Incentive Program.

• **HB 2416** Author: Springer Position: **Oppose** 

This bill would prohibit local governments from enforcing plastic bag bans or regulations, and would negate the City of Austin Single Use Bag Ordinance.

Additional bills that we are monitoring include the following:

• **HB 648** Author: Farias, Joe Position: **Support**Relating to prohibiting the land disposal of computer equipment and certain television equipment. A person may not discard or dispose of covered television equipment at a municipal solid waste facility or a waste-to-energy facility.

HB 1346 Author: Gonzalez, Mary Position: Support
 Relating to the collection and recycling of computer and television equipment by certain
 retailers. A large retailer shall: (1) without charge: (A) accept at the retailer's location during
 normal business hours computer equipment from a consumer; or (B) provide a consumer
 with a system by which the consumer may send computer equipment by mail to the retailer
 or another entity that will recycle or reuse the computer equipment.

HB 1490 Author: Bell, Cecil Position: Oppose
 Relating to collection and use of municipal solid waste fees. Provision of funds for natural gas fueling stations to facilitate the conversion of solid waste diesel fleets to cleaner burning natural gas in nonattainment areas and Travis, Williamson, Hays, and Bexar counties.

Provision of funds for municipal solid waste renewable energy projects; including, waste-to-energy, landfill biogas for electricity, wastewater treatment facility biogas projects to electricity or renewable fuel, and food/yard waste anaerobic digestion.

SB 459 Author: Rodriguez, Jose Position: Support
 HB 1584 Author: Ritter, Allan Position: Support

Relating to the sale, storage, transportation, and disposal of scrap or used tires. Except as provided by Subsection (c), a retail seller shall prohibit a customer from retaining a scrap tire or used tire removed from the customer's vehicle during the purchase of a tire.

SB 645 Author: Ellis, Rodney Position: Support
 HB3244 Author: Callegari, Bill Position: Support

Relating to water quality improvement and pollution reduction through beverage container recycling incentives. Establishment of the Texas Container Recycling Incentive Program ("Bottle Bill")

SB 762 Author: Carona, John Position: Support
 HB 1694 Author: Farrar, Jessica Position: Support

Relating to a prohibition on the disposal of certain used equipment at a municipal solid waste facility. Prohibits the landfilling or incineration of covered television equipment that is eligible for collection under a manufacturer's recovery plan.

• **HB 2368** Author: Allen, Alma Position: **Support** Establishing a study on waste reduction.


## **Recyclable Materials Market Pricing**

As the recycling market cycles were disrupted during the world-wide financial recession, a slow recovery to "normal" recycling market value has begun. The recession affected recycling markets through low production of consumer goods, often the end-use of recycled material. In addition, recycling markets were affected by slow new housing construction, weakened industrial goods production, and limitations in transportation networks.

Market values recovered very well in 2010 and 2011, but then fell for most of 2012. Most industry trade publications are predicting rising markets for 2013. However, several commodities are slow to recover, such as plastics. Aluminum values have bounced back strong. Paper values continue to recover, however they bounce up and down with supply and transportation issues. Ferrous and non-ferrous metals are recovering alongside the recovering appliance and auto industries.

The following chart displays an annual assessment of each commodity based on its annual average value per ton. This depiction of market values illustrates the volatility in market values in recent years.

Paper: Due to organizations merging in the industry, OBM pricing was used for 2000 - 2006, and PPI pricing for 2007 - 2013; each group used its own pricing methodology so there may be variances between the two sources.

#### Special Events Ordinance

As part of Resolution 20120524-089, the Transportation Department's Special Events Office is in the process of developing amendments to the Special Events Ordinance to streamline the special events permitting process. This requires combining the permitting requirements of various departments including those utilized by the Austin Police Department, Austin Fire Department, Austin Transportation Department, Austin/Travis County Emergency Management System, the Austin/Travis County Health Department and several others. Currently, the proposed amendments will apply to events that request a closure of city right of way. The Special Events Office is hosting two public meetings on proposed amendments to the Special Events Ordinance. The first is scheduled for Monday, April 8th at One Texas Center (Room 325) from 6:45 pm-8:45 pm. The second is scheduled for Friday, April 19th at 3pm at a location to be determined. ARR Staff are working Special Events Office staff to include litter control, trash, and recycling requirements as part of the proposed amendments.

## Kite Festival Follow Up

ARR Staff participated in planning for Zilker Kite Festival beginning in January 2013. The festival is presented each year by the Exchange Club of Austin, an all-volunteer 501(c)3 organization dedicated to the prevention of child abuse. The event, held on Sunday, March 3, 2013, estimated approximately 20,000 attendees this year.

For the first time, the event organizers contracted with a private company (Lone Star Latrines) to manage their set up, onsite, and post event litter, trash, and recycling needs. Lone Star provided 150 cardboard trash boxes and set up the 100 ClearStream containers provided by the city. Prior to the event, event organizers also arranged for Lone Star to perform post clean-up services on Monday, March 4, 2013, the day after the event from 8am until the park was completely clean.

Because the event was a city co-sponsored event, Austin Resource Recovery (ARR) provided:

100 ClearStream recycling containers and bags;

Ten 32 gallon trash containers, placed around the perimeter of the event site for citizens leaving the park to dispose of their litter;

Two grease/oil drums to recycle waste grease;

One 40-cubic yard trash roll-off and one 8-cubic yard trash dumpster (paid for by the event);

Two 40-cubic yard recycling roll-offs and one 20-cubic yard recycling roll-off (paid for by the Department); and

Pre-event vendor education

Total waste: 11,800 lbs. (trash-9,610 lbs; recycling-3,440 lbs)

Diversion rate: 26%




