

ORDINANCE NO.

**AN ORDINANCE ADDING CHAPTER 15-13 TO THE CITY CODE TO CREATE
A BOARD TO OVERSEE THE ELECTRIC UTILITY; REPEALING SECTION 2-
1-143 OF THE CITY CODE; AMENDING SECTION 2-7-72 AND SECTION 4-8-3
OF THE CITY CODE TO APPLY TO THE BOARD.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:

PART 1. The City Code is amended to add a new Chapter 15-13 to read:

CHAPTER 15-13. ELECTRIC UTILITY.

ARTICLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

§ 15-13-1. DEFINITIONS.

In this chapter:

- (1) **BOARD** means the Electric Utility Board.
- (2) **CAPITAL PROJECT** means any plant, station, edifice, facility, improvement, or other capitalized investment proposed to be constructed or acquired by the electric utility, including but not limited to the real property, buildings, structures, turbines, towers, panels, piping, equipment, fixtures, water rights, and engineering, design, construction, financing, debt service, and brokerage costs that are part of or incidental to the construction or acquisition.
- (3) **ELECTRIC UTILITY** or **UTILITY** means all facilities, lines, equipment, systems, inventory, and property owned, operated, or acquired by the City, wholly or jointly with others, to generate, transmit, distribute, and meter electrical energy and power, or to provide district cooling and street lighting.
- (4) **RATE** means any rate, fee, or charge for a utility service or product.
- (5) **SYSTEM OBLIGATION** means any bonded indebtedness or outstanding obligation payable in whole or in part from the pledged revenue of the electric utility and the terms, covenants, and conditions contained in an ordinance or contract concerning such indebtedness or obligation.

- 1 (G) Council may remove an appointed member by a vote of two-thirds of
2 council.
- 3 (H) If a vacancy occurs, council shall make an appointment to serve the
4 remainder of the vacated term in the same manner as a regular appointment.
- 5 (I) Members are subject to Chapter 2-7 (*Ethics and Financial Disclosure*).
- 6 (J) Member compensation and expense reimbursement policy, if any, shall be
7 set by separate ordinance.

8 **§ 15-13-22. MEETINGS AND ACTION.**

- 9 (A) A quorum is four members. The board may act only by the favorable vote of
10 at least four members.
- 11 (B) The board may adopt bylaws, establish standing advisory committees, and
12 form temporary working groups of less than a quorum. Board meetings
13 should be conducted under Robert's Rules of Order.
- 14 (C) At the first meeting of each even-numbered year, the board shall elect a
15 chair and vice-chair to serve for a two-year term, or until their successors are
16 elected. The board shall appoint a secretary, who is not required to be a
17 member. The secretary shall keep the records of the board, including those
18 required by Chapter 551, Government Code (*Open Meetings Act*), produce
19 agendas, and record and certify the official minutes.
- 20 (D) The board shall meet at least monthly.
- 21 (E) The board and advisory committees shall comply with Chapters 551 and
22 552, Texas Government Code.
- 23 (F) The board's meeting procedures shall allow time for public comment and
24 encourage public involvement.
- 25 (G) Board agendas shall be posted by the city clerk. A link to current agendas
26 shall be kept on the homepage of the electric utility's website.

27 **ARTICLE 3. BOARD DUTIES**

28 **§ 15-13-30. PURPOSE**

29 The board shall exercise general oversight of the operations and business of the
30 electric utility. The board may take any actions allowed by this chapter and shall
31 advise council on all matters concerning the electric utility as it deems appropriate,
32 or as may be requested by council.

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1 **§ 15-13-31. BOARD ACTION.**

- 2 (A) Except as otherwise provided by this chapter, the board may approve
3 policies, contracts, and expenditures related to the electric utility and the
4 provision of electric service.
- 5 (B) An action of the board may not conflict with a charter provision or an
6 ordinance, resolution, or other action adopted by council.
- 7 (C) All board actions require council review and adoption.

8 **§ 15-13-32. COUNCIL REVIEW OF BOARD ACTIONS**

- 9 (A) An action of the board under Section 15-13-31 (*Board Action*) shall be
10 posted for review and consideration on the next available council agenda in
11 compliance with Code agenda procedures.
- 12 (B) Council may adopt, reject, or modify an action of the board, or may
13 postpone the action for consideration at a later time.

14 **§ 15-13-33. BUDGET AND PLANNING.**

- 15 (A) The board shall provide recommendations on the utility budget to the
16 general manager not less than 120 days before each fiscal year. The board
17 shall have an open and transparent budget review process including holding
18 at least one public hearing.
- 19 (B) The board shall submit to the general manager, not less than 120 days before
20 each fiscal year, a list of recommended capital improvements and
21 amendments to the utility's strategic and generation plans for the next five
22 years.
- 23 (C) Every two years, the board shall present its recommendations regarding the
24 strategic and generation plans to council for public hearing and approval.
- 25 (D) The council, or a council subcommittee, shall hold at least one joint work
26 session with the board annually to discuss strategic and generation plans, the
27 proposed operating and capital budgets, new or revised City policies and
28 master plans, and other matters.
- 29 (E) To increase the transparency of electric utility expenditures, the board shall
30 advise council regarding the level of the general fund transfer, the formula
31 for calculating the transfer, and all other transfers and inter-departmental
32 cost allocations.
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1 **§ 15-13-34. COMPREHENSIVE RATE REVIEWS.**

- 2 (A) The board shall conduct a comprehensive review of electric rates based on a
3 cost-of-service study no less frequently than every five years. The first
4 review shall be made no later than the beginning of fiscal year 2018.
- 5 (B) The board shall adopt procedures for comprehensive rate reviews. The
6 procedures shall, at a minimum, include the following:
- 7 (1) An independent examiner having utility, rate, judicial, or
8 administrative law expertise shall preside over the process and give
9 written findings and recommendations to the board.
- 10 (2) An independent consumer advocate shall represent the interests of
11 residential, low-income, and small commercial customers. The
12 consumer advocate shall be sufficiently funded to allow effective
13 participation, including the ability to retain outside experts.
- 14 (3) Interested customers shall be entitled to party status to the
15 proceedings. The examiner may align customer parties in accordance
16 with shared rate class interests and limit the number of representatives
17 for each class. Residential customers who reside outside the City are
18 entitled to participate as a separate, unaligned rate class.
- 19 (4) Funding for the independent examiner and funding for the consumer
20 advocate shall each not be less than the amount requiring council
21 approval under Article VII, Section 15 of the Charter (*Purchase*
22 *Procedure*).
- 23 (5) The process shall allow a discovery process based on written requests
24 for information and responses. The process shall allow for the
25 protection of information exempt from disclosure pursuant to the
26 Public Information Act.

27 **§ 15-13-35. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

28 This article takes effect on January 1, 2014.

29 **ARTICLE 4. COUNCIL AUTHORITY**

30 **§ 15-13-40. POWERS RETAINED.**

- 31 (A) The council retains its general powers and duties, both express and implied,
32 to regulate, govern, and make policy for the electric utility.
- 33 (B) The board may only provide recommendations concerning the following
34 matters, which shall remain within the exclusive authority of council:

- 1 (1) a transaction or a capital project that has a total cost exceeding \$50
2 million. The general manager may plan, study, assess, design, issue
3 solicitations, and conduct discussions and negotiations regarding
4 capital projects exceeding \$50 million in order to provide relevant
5 information and recommendations to the council for consideration;
- 6 (2) a power purchase contract of more than five years in duration or ten
7 megawatts in capacity. Council shall not approve such a contract
8 unless:
- 9 (a) the contract is solicited in compliance with state law procedures
10 for competitive sealed bidding, competitive sealed proposals, or
11 reverse auction; and
- 12 (b) council holds a public hearing on the contract at least one week
13 before the meeting at which the contract is posted for approval;
- 14 (3) the issuance of debt;
- 15 (4) the exercise of eminent domain;
- 16 (5) the sale or lease of real property;
- 17 (6) rates; and
- 18 (7) the budget of the electric utility and the general fund transfer.

19 **§15-13-41. FUEL AND POWER SUPPLY**

- 20 (A) Council must approve risk management policy regarding contracts and
21 transactions authorized by Section 2256.0201, Government Code.
- 22 (B) For transactions described in this section, the general manager shall comply
23 with the expenditure limits authorized by council over a rolling five-year
24 period.

25 **§15-13-42. ADOPTION OF CUSTOMER CHOICE.**

26 Council is the governing body of the electric utility for the purpose of deciding
27 when or if the electric utility will provide customer choice under Section 40.051,
28 Utilities Code. The board may not consider or adopt a resolution concerning
29 customer choice.

30 **§ 15-13-43. EFFECTIVE DATE.**

31 This article takes effect on January 1, 2014.

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1 **ARTICLE 5. ADMINISTRATION**

2 **§ 15-13-50. ADMINISTRATION.**

- 3 (A) Nothing in this chapter is intended to conflict with the charter concerning the
4 administration of the City, its departments, and its workforce by the city
5 manager or give the board powers over personnel. Employees within the
6 reporting structure of the electric utility shall remain subject to all council-
7 approved policies and ordinances concerning pay, benefits, and personnel,
8 all civil service rules, and the City employee retirement system.
- 9 (B) The electric utility shall be managed and operated by a general manager,
10 who shall be appointed by, report to, and may be removed by the city
11 manager.
- 12 (C) The general manager may adopt rules under Chapter 1-2 (*Adoption of Rules*)
13 to administer and enforce this chapter.
- 14 (D) The board shall be provided with information, other than individual
15 customer information, that is relevant to a matter that is before the board for
16 consideration, or as may be requested by the board. The board and its
17 members shall keep confidential information provided to it that is exempt
18 from disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code (*Public Information*
19 *Act*).
- 20 (E) The board may conduct executive sessions to consider matters exempt from
21 disclosure under the public power utility competitive matters exception to
22 the Section 552.133, Government Code. All other requests for an executive
23 session must be approved by the city attorney.

24 **PART 2.** Section 2-1-143 (*Electric Utility Commission*) of the City Code is repealed.

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26 **PART 3.** Subsection (C) of Section 2-7-72 (*Reports*) of the City Code is amended to
27 read:

- 28 (C) The members of the following boards and commissions shall report the
29 information required by Subsection (E):
- 30 (1) Arts Commission;
 - 31 (2) Board of Adjustment;
 - 32 (3) Electric Utility Board;
 - 33 (4)[(3)] Environmental Board;
 - 34 (5)[(4)] Historic Landmark Commission;
