PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1939 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-and-a-half story, L-plan, frame residence with a projecting front gable and partial-width, shed-roofed, partially-independent front porch; 8:8 and 6:6Colonial Revival-styled fenestration; the window on the left side of the front façade has been replaced with a fixed-sash, plate glass window.

RESEARCH


The house was built in 1939-40 by James C. Barnett, Sr., who apparently built it for his son, James C. Barnett, Jr., who, at the time the house was built, was just getting married, and worked at a gas station on South Congress Avenue, James C. Barnett, Jr. soon became a city police officer, rising to the level of lieutenant before his retirement in 1980. In the mid-1950s, he and Jack Teitelbaum also operated a used car lot on E. 6th Street. James C. Barnett, Jr., and his wife, Mary K. Barnett, lived here until around 1970; the house was then rented by their daughter, Merigay Joseph, and her husband Stephen Joseph. Stephen Joseph was a salesman; they lived here until around 1980. The house has been a rental unit since that time.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house does not appear in any City survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned ketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. The house has neither the architectural nor the historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark, but is likely contributing to a potential historic district in Travis Heights.

James C. Barnett Jr., age 79, of Elgin, died Sunday, July 20, 1997.

Jake graduated from Austin High School where he was a Golden Gloves boxing champion and played football and baseball. He married Mary Kate Bryan of Rice's Crossing on September 29. 1940. A year later he became an officer with the Austin Police Department. Jake served in World Ward II as a Sergeant with the U.S. Army, Criminal Investigation Division in the Phillipines. Upon his return from military service he resumed his duties with APD until he retired in 1980, as a Police Lieutenant. Mary Kate Bryan Barnett, also known as "Auntie Kate" or "Mamaw", put death behind her on August 14, 2000.

Mary Kate was born on July 26, 1915, to Charles Page Bryan and Sudie Lee Elkins, on the River's Ranch farm, near Hoxie, in Williamson County. She was the eldest daughter of the six children produced by the farming couple. Accordingly, she had to learn how to cook, keep house, and be a surrogate mother to her siblings.

On September 29, 1940, she married James C. Barnett Jr., and started a family of her own. After the kids got old enough. Katie began a lengthy career with the Austin Carbonic Co., waiting on customers and keeping the books. The experiences of her youth, and the historical events through which she lived as a young adult, helped to prepare her for the roles she would play for the rest of her life; wife, mother, grandmother, greatgrandmother, educator, poet, confidant, financier, friend, and the "glue" that held the family together.

Other than her family, she most loved reading: doing crossword puzzles; spoiling children; and puttering around the "Old Broken Down Farm" in Elgin, Texas.

She is predeceased by her parents; her brothers, Noble, Charles, and Woodrow; her sisters. Lee Page and Laverne; and her husband of 56 years. James C. Barnett Jr.

She is survived by sons, James C.
