PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1951 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, irregular-plan, hipped-roof brick-veneered frame house with a central, partial-width front-gabled independent porch on square, brick piers; ornamental gables on the left (east) side of the house at each corner; one-story-rectangular-plan, side gabled addition to the rear and right (west) of the main house; detached, one-story, rectangular-plan front-gabled frame garage (faces west). The main house has a combination of metal-framed combination picture and casement windows and 1:1 wood-frame windows in paired and triple configurations; the central, front door has a paneled surround.

RESEARCH

According to city building and utility records, the house was built in the fall/winter of 1951-1952 by R.J. and Thelma McKown, who had previously lived at 4910 Shoal Creek Boulevard. R.J. McKown was a highway contractor, but started as a house carpenter in Frisco, Texas, and later in Stephenville with his three sons after his wife, Susie, passed away. By 1940, the McKown family was living in Austin, where R.J. was listed as a highway contractor; his sons, Obert, Austin, and Arthur, were part of the family's business, which was known as R.J. McKown and Sons Construction Company, with headquarters on 49th Street in Austin. R.J. McKown and Sons was the contractor for the construction of the Austin Expressway. R.J. McKown married Thelma Roberts by the time they built this house in 1951. He and Thelma lived here until his death in 1957; she continued to live here until her death in 1968. The house remained in the McKown family until the mid-1970s, when it was sold to Hollie and Bertha James. Hollie James owned a truck supply business on Kramer Lane known as Donco, Inc.; he and Bertha lived here until recently. Hollie James died in 2009.

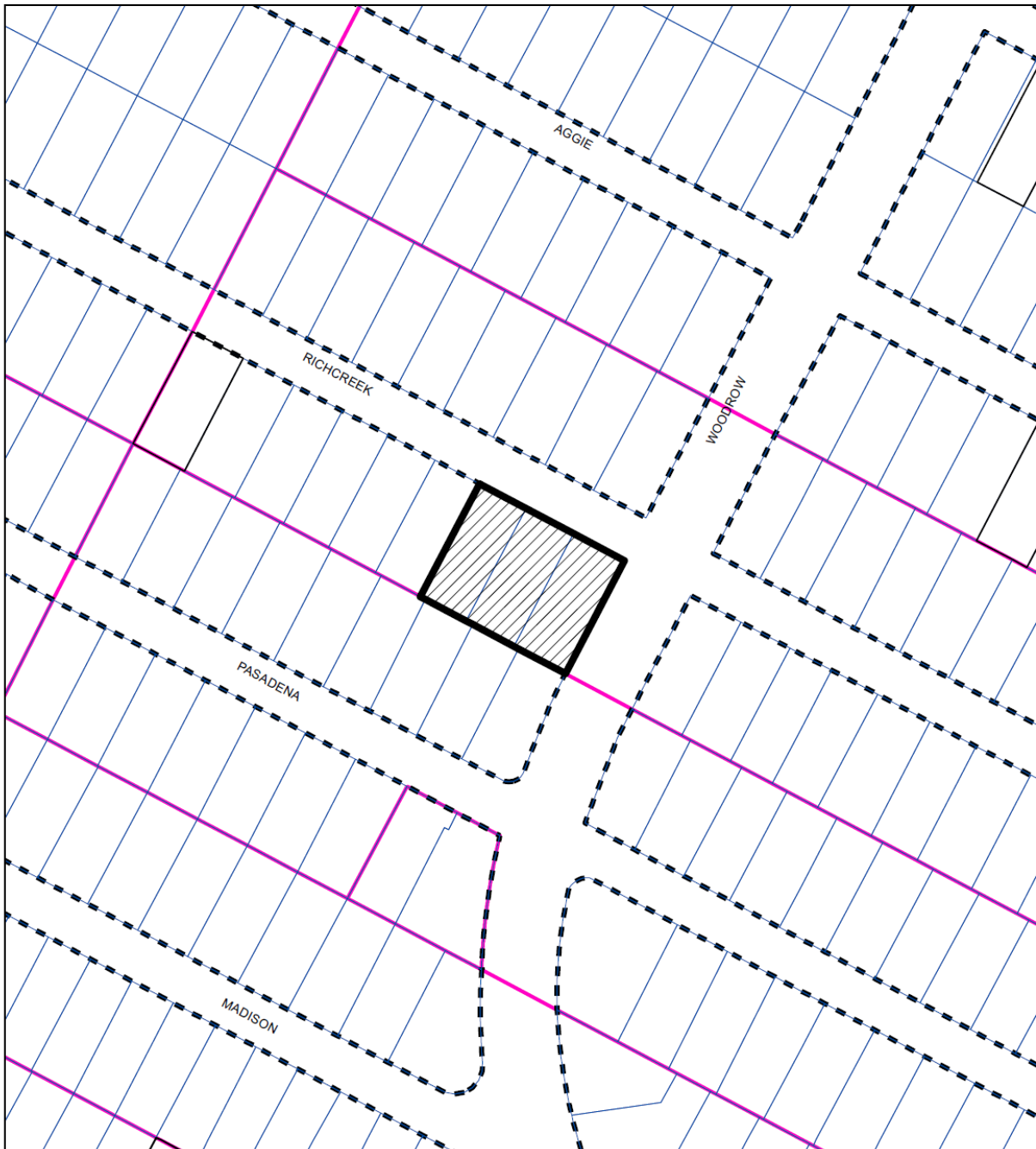
STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history for archiving at the Austin History Center. While the house is one of the largest in the neighborhood, it does not have sufficient historical or architectural significance to warrant individual landmark designation.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Robert J. and Thelma McKown (ca. 1951 – ca. 1968)

Robert J. and Thelma McKown appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the renters of a house at 1812 Kenwood Avenue. Robert J. McKown was then 56, had been born in Georgia, and was a highway construction contractor. Thelma McKown was then 32, and had been born in Texas. She had no occupation listed. They had lived in Lubbock in 1935, and had no children listed with them. The 1930 U.S. Census shows Robert McKown, a widower, living in Stephenville, Texas with his three sons, Obert, 26, Austin, 23, and Arthur, 21, and their families. Robert J. McKown and all of the boys are listed as building contractors. All the boys had been born in

Texas. The 1920 U.S. Census shows Robert J. and Susie McKown living in a rented house in Frisco, Texas, where Robert J. McKown was house carpenter.

McKown's Burial Set Tomorrow

Funeral services will be held Monday for R. J. McKown, well-known Austin contractor, who died here early Saturday morning. He was 74.

Until his retirement two years ago ending 50 years in the contracting business, he was senior partner of the R. J. McKown and Sons Construction Company. The firm built the Austin Expressway.

For the past 20 years he had been a resident of Austin. He was a member of Crestview Baptist Church and the Austin chapter of the Associated General Contractors.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 10 a.m. from the Weed-Corley Funeral Home on North Lamar Boulevard. Rev. Robert Holt, pastor of Crestview Baptist Church, officiating. Burial will be at Austin Memorial Park.

Survivors are his wife; three sons, O. B. McKown, A. S. McKown and A. L. McKown, all of Austin; one sister, Mrs. Nina Stevens of Lubbock; five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.
