THE PROBLEM

- Austin area population doubles every 20 years and so is its trash generation
 - —Zero Waste Masterplan adopted by City Council in Dec 2011 95% diversion
 - Implementation of comprehensive curbside recycling
 - Universal Recycling Ordinance Phase I and II
- Most materials collected for recycling in Central Austin are sent to markets abroad
- Land values/costs/availability in Central Texas makes attraction of recycling-related manufacturing difficult
- Austin's most vulnerable are being left out of the economic boom
 - Job creation is not keeping up with population growth, especially for Central Texas most vulnerable or least skilled populations.
 - Manufacturing offers the greatest opportunity for hard-to-employ: unemployed, underemployed, ex-offenders and others



AUSTIN RECYCLING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Austin is creating a comprehensive program to help build and sustain markets for recyclable materials being collected through the Zero Waste Master Plan

- Identify the current recycling/reuse markets in Austin/Central Texas
- Address the greatest challenges for recycling/reuse in Austin/Central Texas
 - —Low market value
 - –Most volatile markets
 - Materials transported great distances
 - —Hard-to-recycle/manage materials
- Create local materials exchange to help business with a waste connect with businesses that can value-add that waste into new products
- Promote locally-made recycled, repurposed, remanufactured products
- Develop local eco-industrial park at city's closed landfill site


- City-owned land returning to productive use
- Builds local markets for the City's Zero Waste goals




- Incubates small business and new innovations

* Approximately 107 acres in ETJ offers regional markets for Central Texas









Approximately 107 acres in ETJ
