The 78744 Community Youth Development (CYD) Program, formerly known as Southeast Austin Community Youth Development (SEACYD), has been funded since 1996 by the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (TDFPS). The goal of the initiative is to prevent juvenile delinquency through the provision of community based prevention and remediation programs in the Southeast Austin 78744 zip code area. Grant Goal Priority Categories have been established for community-based programs for all youth who live in, and/or attend school in the 78744 zip code area, particularly targeting at-risk, disconnected youth. In accordance with the grant, the 2012-2013 Needs Assessment, and approval by the 78744 Community Collaborative Committee, the recommended programs and services are eligible to be funded under the grant.

A Request for Application (RFA) was issued on November 7, 2013. Two agencies applied. The review committee recommended awards be made to both Mexic-Arte Museum and Theatre Action Project dba Creative Action art and theatre role playing programs. The grantor, TDFPS, has approved this overall service delivery plan. Grant Goal Priority Categories have been established for community-based programs for all youth who live in, and/or attend school in the 78744 zip code area, particularly targeting at-risk, disconnected youth. In accordance with the grant, the 2012-2013 Needs Assessment, and approval by the 78744 Community Collaborative Committee, the recommended programs and services are eligible to be funded under the grant.

For this year, Council approval will increase the current period contract (4<sup>th</sup> year) funding of \$45,900 by \$29,085.05 to Mexic-Arte Museum for the current period, 9/1/2013-8/31/2014, for a year total amount of \$74,985.05. These funds will be used to support the delivery of after-school and during-school programs, working with artists from the community who will provide the Art Outreach program. The museum's educational programs offer youth opportunities to engage in cultural activities and increase their participation in artistic activities.

For this year, Council approval will increase the current period contract (4<sup>th</sup> year) funding of \$49,346.94 by \$29,000 to Theatre Action Project dba Creative Action for the current period, 9/1/2013-8/31/2014, for a year total amount of \$78,346.94. These funds will be used to support delivery of the following after-school and summer programs: Crossing the Line; Courage to Stand/Courage in Action, and Summer Programming. Crossing the Line is a program for middle school students to identify and overcome barriers to their own personal success. Courage to Stand/Courage in Action is an interactive program for elementary students to work with youth about changing classroom cultures to not accept bullying, hate or violence. The Summer Program will be a blend of creative arts and education for 5th to 7th grade youth.
