HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION MARCH 24, 2014 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2014-0122 304 W. MILTON STREET

PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1925 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled, board-and-batten frame house with a full-width, shed-roofed, independent porch; single 1:1 fenestration.

RESEARCH

The house appears to have been built around 1925 as a rental property, although the style and construction type of the house is reminiscent of much older cabins. The 1922 Sanborn map shows a house on this site, but that house has no front porch, and the front porch on this house appears to be integral to the design. City directories before 1927 do not list any houses on W. Milton Street, so a 1925 construction date appears a reasonable assumption. The first tenants were Hester and Solomon Weldon (or Wellman, as they appear in later directories), who had no occupations listed. Hester and Solomon Weldon were both African-American, and this area was part of an African-American residential section, with the African-American Goodwill Baptist Church across Milton Street at the corner of Newton Street. However, the 1929 city directories shows David and Lena Clawson, who are not indicated as being African-Americans, as tenants of the house. Neither of the Clawsons had an occupation listed. Early city directories show the address of this house as 302 W. Milton Street, and this is borne out by the 1935 Sanborn map, but the 1935 city directory does not list 302 W. Milton as an address, and from that point forward, the house is listed as 304 W. Milton Street. The house was vacant in 1935, and in 1937, James C. and Bettie V. Fincher are shown as the tenants – they went on to rent the house at 400 W. Milton Street (also a case on tonight's agenda for demolition).

Around 1938, the house was purchased to E. Frank and Lorraine Short, who lived here until around 1946. Frank Short was a native of Travis County; he grew up on a rented farm on Barton Springs Road, worked as an odd-job teamster and cotton picker, and after he married and moved into this house, worked as a truck driver and a stone mason. Lorraine Short worked in a laundry and later, as a clerk in a bakery. Their daughter, Ellen, rented this house with her husband in the mid-1940s after her parents had moved away. It is not clear if Frank Short could read and write – his 1918 World War I draft registration card was filled out by the registrar and Frank made an "X" as his mark, but census reports indicate that he was literate.

The house has been used as rental property since the mid-1940s. Later tenants have included a meat cutter, a mechanic, and a laborer.

STAFF COMMENTS


The house is listed in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984) with a Priority 2 for research.


STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The house has deteriorated significantly, and while its architectural style hearkens back to an early cabin style, there is no evidence to document it earlier than the mid-1920s. Staff

therefore recommends release of the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. This single-wall construction house does not appear to be sufficiently structurally sound to warrant relocation, and rehabilitation of the house will necessarily mean installation of a lot of new material, compromising the integrity of materials, so documentation is likely the best means for recording its existence and history.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Frank and Lorraine Short (ca. 1938 – ca. 1946)

Frank and Lorraine Short are listed in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$600. Frank Short was then 40, had been born in Texas, and was a laborer in building construction. Lorraine Short was then 35, had been born in Texas, and was a finisher in a laundry. They had 2 daughters: Dorothy, 15; and Ellen, 12. Ellen Short later married James D. Seals; they are listed as the renters of this house in the 1947 city directory.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows E. F. and Lorraine Short renting a house at 1306 S. 1st Street in Austin; he was a truck driver for a hauling company. They had a boarder, another truck driver for a hauling company. The 1920 U.S. Census shows him living with his parents, Duff and Lula Short, on the Barton Springs Road in South Austin, where his father rented a farm. Frank is listed as a teamster doing job work. Ellis Frank Short's World War I draft registration card shows that he was living on a rural route in South Austin, but that he was employed as a cotton picker in Mart, Limestone County, Texas. He apparently could not read or write – his card had been filled out by the registrar and E.F. Short made his mark.


ELLIS F. SHORT

Ellis Frank Short, 63, of 2514 Wilson, died Sunday at his home. He had been a lifelong resident of Travis County.




Funeral notice for Frank Short Austin American, July 2, 1963


