PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1925 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, front-gabled frame bungalow with a partial-width, front-gabled partially-inset porch on single, plain wood posts; single 1:1 fenestration.

RESEARCH


The house appears to have been built around 1925; the first owners and occupants were Arthur and Lydia Peiser, who moved here from rural Travis County. They first appear in the 1927 city directory at the old address for this house, 62 Waller Street. Arthur Peiser had been born in Rockdale, Texas in 1898, and grew up on a farm owned by his stepfather, L. Wilhelm, near Taylor, Texas. Both the 1910 U.S. Census and his 1918 World War I draft registration card show him on his stepfather's farm. By 1920, he was living on his own in Taylor, and working as a mattress maker, a career which would last the rest of his life. According to the 1924 city directory, when he and Lydia were still living in rural Travis County, Arthur and his brother Alfred were the owners of the Guarantee Mattress Factory at 1508 Sabine Street. Later directories show that he was a mattress maker for the Hurley Mattress and Awning Company at 500 E. 6th Street. He and Lydia lived here until around 1939, when they moved to a house at 3201 Lafayette Avenue. It is possible that his daughter, Ardyce (noted as Ardy in the 1930 U.S. Census), and her husband, Victor W. Brown, a welder, rented this house from her parents in the early 1940s. The house had a number of renters in the late 1940s and through the 1950s, including a garage manager, a bakery salesman, a carpenter, and a dairy truck driver. By 1960, the house was owned and occupied by Antonio and Emma Imperial; it remained in their family for over 40 years. Antonio Imperial worked as a car painter and mechanic for various dealerships in town, including the forerunner to Leif Johnson Ford; at the time of his death in 1964, he was working for Jack Stableford, the local Pontiac dealer. Emma Imperial remained in the house after Antonio's death; she worked for Aus-Tex Chili factory.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house does not appear in any City survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. While the house has neither the architectural nor the historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark, it is a good, and intact example of a mid-1920s frame bungalow.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Arthur and Lydia Peiser (ca. 1925 – ca. 1940)

Arthur and Lydia Peiser appear in the 1930 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$2,200. Arthur Peiser was then 32, had been born in Texas, and was a mattress maker at the Hurley Mattress Factory. Lydia Peiser was then 28, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 daughters: Anna, 7; and Ardy, 3. With them lived Lydia's sister, Bertha Danchak, 19, who had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed. The father of Lydia Peiser and Bertha Danchak had been born in Czechoslovakia.

Arthur Peiser appears in the 1920 U.S. Census for Taylor, Texas, where he was a 21-year old single man; he was a mattress maker. The 1910 U.S. Census shows Arthur Peiser as the 12-year old step-son of L. and Emma Wilhelm, both German-born farmers in Williamson County. Arthur had no occupation listed. Arthur Peiser's 1918 World War I draft registration card shows that he was born March 30, 1898, and was living on L. Wilhelm's farm outside of Taylor, Texas.

His death certificate shows that he was born in Rockdale, Texas, and at the time of his death was the owner of the Austin Awning and Bedding Company.

Antonio and Emma Imperial appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the renters of a house at 305 Nueces Street. Antonio Imperial was then 31, had been born in Mexico, and was a painter in a garage. Emma Imperial was then 27, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. The census report shows that Antonio Imperial had lived in the same house in 1935; Emma Imperial had lived in Georgetown, Texas. Antonio Imperial's death certificate shows that he was born in Texas, was an American citizen, and was working for Jack Stableford, a Pontiac dealer, at the time of his death.




