Inspector comments continued: DSHS was led on a tour of the facility by Dr. Anderson and Holi Odom. AAS was buzzing with volunteers walking and playing with animals; staff cleaning and feeding and admin staff preparing to open the facility.

① DSHS noticed construction crews on-site when arriving. It was apparent at the start of the tour that major repairs were underway. Due to cost cutting during initial construction and landscaping, resources were cut. The facility is showing the mark of several years at the location and different weather (drought and then heavy rain). Pillars next to several dog wards were leaning and had to be removed. ~~many~~ French drains are being put in place along these areas. Trees that were saved next to buildings (300) have had their landscaping erode. Sink holes have also appeared on the property.

② Food must be stored at least 12" off the ground to adequately clean underneath and prevent vermin infestation. Please remove the food from the pallets and place on shelving.

③ Next Advisory Committee held 10.09.13

④ Primary enclosures are showing their wear. Dog doors are very discolored (dirty?); chewed off or non-existent. Primary enclosures remain ~~to be used~~ used for other than their initial intention. Small dogs in cat wards; overflow dogs in lanes observation, rabbit run, dogs in offices, modified for kittens, exotic room for office.

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Inspector comments continued: ④ The facility remains to hold animals in places that it was not designed to do so. Along with facility design, parking was noted to be an issue today, not only for DSHS personnel but others visiting the facility.

⑤ DSHS observed records for both canine and feline animals from intake to final disposition.

⑥ DSHS requested proof of ACO CE from Austin Animal Control in September 2013. To date records of ACO CE are still pending. DSHS must have all documentation requested by close of business on October 31, 2013. The shelter certificate (quarantine) will be held until documentation is received and reviewed.

* This facility remains in keeping an upward attitude w/ the # of animals being held and the lack of resources. Staff positions are filled to care for the animals but does not allocate for time off (i.e. sick, vacation, etc.) when a staff member is out, sanitization/cleaning suffers in both time and attention.

While today's # of occupants remain up, DSHS noted numerous vacant kennels (both feline & canine) this was due to litters and multiple dog sharing large sites.

DSHS commends all the staff at Austin Animal Services/Center for their commitment to protect and serve the pets of Austin/Texas County.
