HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION APRIL 28, 2014 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2014-0191 3400 WINDSOR ROAD

PROPOSAL

The applicant proposes to demolish the east study of the house, remove the north (back) wall, construct a new rear and side addition, and reconfigure the façade of the house. The house will be re-clad in smooth hardi-plank, have all the windows replaced so that the symmetrical configuration of the existing Colonial Revival house will be altered, and the house will have a new portico added over the front door.

ARCHITECTURE

Two-story, rectangular-plan, hipped roof, frame Colonial Revival-styled house with a copper awning over the central front door; symmetrical façade with a central entry, single 8:8 windows with shutters; the windows on the ground floor have a paneled wainscot beneath the glazing.

RESEARCH

The house was built in 1939-1940 by Robert B. Baldwin and his wife, Jean. Robert Baldwin was a native of Wisconsin, and was a textbook salesman when he and Jean built this house. Jean was the supervisor of the WPA Sewing Room. Robert eventually went into state government, and was on the Governor's staff for a time as well as working for the Texas Education Agency. Jean Baldwin eventually went into real estate. They lived here until around 1943. The house was then purchased by Daniel and Bernice Grieder. Daniel Grieder was a native of Illinois, who had studied at a Presbyterian seminary in Dubuque, Iowa, and came to Austin in the late 1920s to serve as pastor of the Presbyterian church. He later became the dean of Durham's Business College. Bernice Grieder was the executive assistant for the Texas Industrial Accident Board, and eventually became a lawyer and insurance adjuster. Daniel and Bernice Grieder apparently divorced in the early 1950s, and moved out of this house; Daniel moved to Westlake Hills, and Bernice is no longer shown in city directories. From the mid-1950s until around 2001, the house was owned and occupied by Roy and Loyola Beal. Roy Beal was a furniture salesman who eventually opened his own interior design firm on Guadalupe Street.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey.

Staff does not believe that the house has sufficient historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark, but the house is a wonderful example of Colonial Revival style. It is not clear who designed this house, but it clearly looks like the work of Hugo Kuehne, who was known for his Colonial Revival designs in Pemberton Heights and other areas of West Austin.


STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Robert and Jean Baldwin (ca. 1940 - ca. 1943)

Robert B. And Jean C. Baldwin are listed as the owners of this house in the 1940 U.S. Census. The house was worth \$9,000. Robert B. Baldwin was then 33, had been born in Wisconsin, and was a salesman for a textbook company. Jean C. Barrow was then 31, had been born in Texas, and was the supervisor of the WPA Sewing Room. In 1935, she had lived in Cleburne, Texas. They had no children listed, but did have a servant, Annie Petrasek, 31, who had been born in Texas and had lived in Taylor, Texas in 1935.

ROBERT B. BALDWIN Robert B. Baldwin, 72, of 1905 Vista Lane, a longtime Austin businessman and retired state employee, died Saturday in Austin. He is survived by his wife, Jean Baldwin, a prominent Austin realtor, his son, Robert C., Baldwin, a Houston banker, and his sister, Mrs. J. Kendrick Noble, Services will be held at 10:30 A.M. Tuesday in Weed-Corley Euneral Home, with Father Richard McCabe officiating. Burial will be in Austin Memorial Park. Pallbearers will be Jack Sparks, Charles Millhouse, G.C. Daniel E. and Bernice Grieder (ca. 1943 – ca. 1953)

Daniel and Bernice Grieder are listed in the 1940 U.S. Census at 3807 Avenue G in Austin. Daniel Grieder was then 45, had been born in Illinois, and was the dean of a private business college. Bernice Grieder was then 31, had been born in Texas, and was the executive secretary for the State Industrial Accident Board. The had 2 sons: Daniel, 10; and Paul, 7. Both boys had been born in Texas. The 1930 U.S. Census shows Daniel and Bernice Grieder renting a house at 706 ½ W. 23rd Street in Austin. Daniel was the minister of the Presbyterian Church; Bernice had no occupation listed. Their son, Daniel, was 4 months old. Daniel Grieder's 1917 World War I draft registration card shows that he was living in Dubuque, Iowa, where he was a student of divinity. He was 22, and had been born in Sutter, Illinois. He was single.

Bernice Grieder died in Washington, DC on August 21, 1989 and was buried in Wichita Falls, Texas. There was no obituary in the Austin newspapers.

Daniel Edwin Grieder

Daniel Edwin Grieder, age 90, of Austin died Sunday.

He first came to Austin in 1928, as Pastor of the First Presbyterain Church, at 7th & Lavaca Streets, where he served for 11 years. In 1940, he accepted the position of Dean of Durham's Business College and served in this capacity for almost 20 years, retiring in 1959. After retirement, he moved to Virginia (Fairfax County, near Mt. Vernon) and was married to Jeanie Burns in April 1960. In 1977, he moved to La Jolla, California. He moved to Westminster Manor to be among his old friends of long ago.

He was known as the song leader of Zilker Park's Hillside, Thursday and Sunday night singing programs for almost 25 years.
