Why Revise the Code?


- Last comprehensive revision in 1984, amended hundreds of times
- Complexity of Code convolutes the permitting and approval process for all parties
- Austin area growing by 140 people a day
- Tool for implementing Imagine Austin



Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan



- Adopted community vision
- Guide for managing change
- Reference for decision making
- Direction for more detailed city plans, investments, initiatives

Code Diagnosis

- Summarizes major issues identified by public, staff, and consulting team
- Defines basis for revising Code
- Does not recommend direction for new Code
- Findings will help define Alternative
 Approaches and Annotated Outline

- 1. Ineffective Base Zoning Districts
- 2. Competing Layers of Regulations
- 3. Complicated "Opt-in, Opt-Out" System
- Lack of Household Affordability and Housing Choice
- 5. Auto-Centric Code
- 6. LDC Not Always In Line with Imagine Austin
- 7. Lack of Clarity and Usability
- 8. Ineffective Digital Code
- Code Changes Adversely Affect Department Organization
- 10.Incomplete and Complicated Administration and Procedures

Regulations are Creating Auto-Dependent Density




Diagram of parking lots and driveways, shown in grey

Community Character Analysis

- Supplements adopted Neighborhood Plans,
 which cover less than half of city limits
- Helps Consultant team understand Austin's diverse neighborhoods
- Understand distinct qualities of individual neighborhoods
- Understand common qualities among neighborhoods



Understanding Community Character

The Code should respond to the "DNA" of an area: the streets, blocks, parks and open spaces, that make each place unique.




Northwest Hills

Photo documentation

- Residential character
- Commercial character









Different Places Require Different Regulations











Community Character Manual

- Compilation of photo documentation and analysis maps
- Living document to be augmented throughout
 2014
- Informs drafting of Code by helping identify appropriate regulations for range of neighborhoods
- Asset mapping will assist with applying the new Code on the ground





Code Approach Alternatives and Annotated Outline

- 3 approaches to reorganization and rewriting of Code
- Outline will provide general understanding of organization
- Approach selected by Council will establish general direction for new Code
- Specific content of new Code will not be spelled out



Summary of Process and Schedule

- Opportunities for public, board & commission, and Council input at each step
- City Council direction on Approaches in Fall of 2014
- Code writing doesn't begin till Council selects approach
