PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1938 house that is contributing to the Historic District.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, cross-gabled, brick house with a projecting front gable containing a smaller front-facing gable containing a round-arched doorway and battered walls; single and paired 6:6 and 8:8 fenestration; non-historic metal roof.

RESEARCH

The house was built in 1938 by Patterson Tearl, a local real estate investor. The first owners and occupants were Hjalmar and Hulda Knape, who moved here from a house on San Antonio Street. Both Hjalmar and Hulda Knape were Swedish immigrants. Hjalmar Knape got into the printing business, and was publishing the Austin <u>Dispatch</u> newspaper and the Texas <u>Posten</u>, a Swedish-language paper, in addition to commercial printing jobs. He and Hulda lived here until around 1946. The house was then owned and occupied by Weldon W. and Lucille Darst for about 2 years – he was the chief switchman for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. By 1948, the house had been purchased by Thomas H. Lockhart and his new wife, Martha. Thomas Lockhart was a widower, who had started off in the home building business, then went into real estate and insurance. By the time he purchased his house, he was a real estate and insurance broker, with offices first at 911 W. 5th Street, and later at 902 N. Lamar Boulevard. He lived here until around 1970. From then on, the house was owned and occupied by David R. and Rosario Baxter; Baxter was the editor of the magazine of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house is listed as contributing to the Old West Austin National Register Historic District.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center, and not until the Commission reviews the plans for any new construction on this site. While the house has some associations with Hjalmar Knape, who was a leader in Austin's Swedish community and the publisher of the city's Swedish-language newspaper, his house at $1402\frac{1}{2}$ San Antonio Street, which still stands, had a much more significant association with his life and career, and would be the better candidate for landmark designation.



BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Hjalmar T. and Hulda Knape (ca. 1939 – ca. 1946)

Hjalmar and Hulda Knape appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$4,750. Hjalmar Knape was 62,had been born in Sweden, and was the owner of a printing plant. Hulda Knape was also 62, had been born in Sweden, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 lodgers: Cleo Key, 21, who had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed; he had lived in Eastland, Texas in 1935; and M. Bradford Gardner, 32, who had been born in Connecticut and was an English instructor at the University of Texas. He had lived in Hartford, Connecticut in 1935. The 1930 U.S. Census shows Hjalmar and Hulda Knape as the owners of the house at 500 W. 14th Street in Austin. Hjalmar Knape was listed as a publisher and printer. They had a son, Wilbur, 19, who had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed.

Knape, 74, died at her home, 1402 1-2 San Antonio Street, Tuesday,

She had been a resident of Austin the past 26 years and a member of the Methodist Church 25 years.

The body is at the Wilke-Connelly Funeral Home and services await the arrival of out of town relatives and completion of funeral arrangements.

Thomas H. and Martha Lockhart (ca. 1948 – ca 1970)

Thomas H. Lockhart appears in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owner of the house at 3908 Duval Street. He was a 60-yar old Illinois-born widower who was the manager of an insurance and loan business. With him lived his 2 daughters: Josleen, a 29-yar old divorcee who had been born in Cuba, and who had no occupation listed; and Frances, 24, who had been born in Kansas and was a saleslady in a department store. The 1930 U.S. Census shows that Thomas H. Lockhart had been married to a woman named Susie, who had been born in Missouri. The 1930 U.S. Census also shows Thomas H. Lockhart as a home builder.

Shoal Creek Blvd., died in a E Shople Hospital Friday hafternoon.

He had been a resident of r Austin since 1929 and a member 1 of the Central Christian Church's where he had been an Elder for r many years. Lockhart was a member of the Austin Stamp Club and a veteran of the Spanish American War. He was state Commander pest War Spanish American Veterans and was appointed Brevet Brigadier General in the Texas National Guard. Lockhart was in the insurance business in Austin from 1929 to 1971.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Martha Lockhart of Austin; four daughters, Josleen Lockhart, Frances Lockhart and Mrs. Sterling Sasser Jr., all of Austin and Mrs. Richard F. Miller of Angola, West Africa; a sister, Mrs. F. A. Fuller of Tyler; six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.
