PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1950 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled International style stuccoed concrete block house with an attached carport; metal-framed casement windows.

RESEARCH

The house was built in 1950 by Rogan Giles, the son of Bascom Giles, a real estate developer in this neighborhood, whose trademark style was a small, ranch-style concrete block house (they also built two-story duplexes north of 38th Street) in the International style with metal-framed casement windows. The first known owners and occupants were Arthur and Wilma Davis; he was in the Air Force. The house was vacant in the mid-1950s, and rented by a lineman for Ragsdale Aviation in the late 1950s. It was vacant again in the early 1960s, then purchased by Oscar L. and Madge Truiett, who lived here for the rest of their lives. Oscar L. Truiett grew up on a farm in Bastrop County; he was a weigher at the Municipal Abattoir (meat slaughterhouse) in the early 1960s, worked for Austin Livestock in the late 1960s, and was a janitor at the Downtowner Motor Inn (now the downtown La Quinta) at 11th Street and San Jacinto Boulevard in the early 1970s. He died in 1982. Madge, his widow, continued to live here until her death in 1993.


STAFF COMMENTS

Oscar and Madge Truiett (ca. 1960 - 1993)

Oscar Truiett appears in the 1930 U.S. Census of Bastrop County, Texas as the 19-year old step-son of John and Fannie McDuff, who lived on a rented farm. John McDuff and Oscar Truiett are both listed as farmers on a general farm. The 1940 U.S. Census shows Oscar and Madge Truiett living on a rented farm in Bastrop County. Oscar Truiett was 29 and listed as a farmer; Madge Truiett was 21, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had a 1-year old daughter, Jo Anne.

TRUIETT, Oscar L., 71, 3801 Grayson Lane, died Wednesday. Services 1:30 p.m. Friday at Hyltin-Manor Funeral Chapel. Burial, Elgin City Cemetery. Survivors: wife, Madge Truiett of Austin; daughter, Jo Ann Phillips of Austin; sister, Barbara Patterson of Houton; six grandchildren.
