The Pease Park Conservancy (PPC) and the Parks and Recreation Department have partnered on the development of the first master plan for Pease District Park, revealing an exciting vision for one of Austin's oldest parks. With an overall focus on enhancing and preserving the naturalistic feel of the park and adjacent Shoal Creek Greenbelt, opportunities were identified for improving gateways, sensitively adapting the historic Tudor Cottage restroom building, and enhancing the playscape area. Additionally, the plan calls for more bridge crossings across Shoal Creek and a much improved and enhanced trail system.

The Master Plan will serve as the conceptual framework for the development of the park in the next 20 years. In conceiving the plan PARD included a Technical Advisory Group (TAG) comprised of key City personnel representing various internal departments. The TAG committee provided input on future projects, requirements, regulations, and permitting issues associated with any and all proposed improvements within the master plan area. The public engagement process was robust and included three well-attended public meetings and an online survey that garnered nearly 1,000 responses.
