QUALIFICATIONS FOR LANDMARK DESIGNATION:

Architecture and Historical Associations. The house is an excellent example of a mid-1920s Craftsman bungalow and has long associations with Louis Goldberg, the business manager and later publisher of the <u>American-Statesman</u> newspaper for many years, and a prominent member of Austin's Jewish community.

BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION:

Architecture:

One-story, wing-and-gable plan frame bungalow with a partial-width, shed-roofed independent porch on plain, square wood posts and an ornamental metal railing; single, paired, and triple 1:1 fenestration with decorative wood window screens.

Historical Associations:

The house was built in 1927 for Louis N. and Maude Goldberg, who moved in here from a house at 1507 Guadalupe Street. Born in Nacogdoches, Texas, Louis N. Goldberg was the son of Jewish immigrants from Germany, who moved from Nacogdoches to Lufkin while Louis was still a child, and had previously lived in Michigan. Louis' father, David Goldberg, is listed in early census as a merchant in Nacogdoches, and a restaurant keeper in Lufkin. By 1918,

according to his World War I draft registration card, Louis was living in Beaumont, Texas, where he was the book-keeper for the Beaumont <u>Journal</u> Publishing Company, which published the local newspaper. The 1920 U.S. Census shows him living in a Beaumont boarding house and listed as a book-keeper for the newspaper. A 1922 listing of newspaper executives in Texas shows that Louis Goldberg was the general manager of the Beaumont <u>Journal</u> at that time. He then moved to Austin in 1923, and became the cashier of the Austin <u>American</u>, which had been purchased by Charles E. Marsh in 1919. Marsh and his partner, E.S. Fentress, bought the afternoon Austin paper, the <u>Evening Statesman</u>, in 1924, and Louis Goldberg became the auditor of the company that was established by Marsh and Fentress to run both the morning and afternoon papers. By 1927, at the time he purchased this property and had this house built, Goldberg was the business manager of the Austin newspapers, a position he held until becoming associate publisher, and finally publisher in the early 1950s. Goldberg was also a vice-president of Newspapers, Inc., which bought the Marsh interests in the <u>American-Statesman</u> in 1948. Newspapers, Inc. also owned the daily papers in Waco, Port Arthur, and Lufkin.

Besides his influential role at the <u>American-Statesman</u>, Louis Goldberg and his wife, Maude were also very active in a multitude of civic and cultural activities in the city. They were early members of Temple Beth Israel and served on various temple committees. Louis Goldberg was the president of the Austin Chamber of Commerce in the 1950s, and also served on the Lay Committee for St. Edward's.







BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Louis N. and Maude Goldberg (ca. 1927 - ca. 1954)

Louis and Maude Goldberg appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$5,000. Louis N. Goldberg was 48, had been born in Texas, and was the business manager for the newspaper. Maude Goldberg was 44, had been born in Louisiana, and had no occupation listed. They had a daughter, Regina Helene, 15, who had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed.. The Goldbergs also had a live-in servant, Hattie Mickon, 24. The 1930 U.S. Census shows the Goldbergs at this house with their daughter, Regina Helene. They had a boarder, Goldie Stern, 41, who had been born in Texas to Russian-born parents, and who worked as a stenographer for a lawyer; and a servant, Leona Roach, 16. Louis Goldberg was listed as the business manager for the newspaper. Louis Goldberg's World War I draft registration card shows that he was living in Beaumont, where he was the book-keeper for the Beaumont Journal Publishing Company. He had been born in Nacogdoches, Texas on February 28, 1892, and was single. He was of medium height and a slender build with brown eyes and black hair. The 1920 U.S. Census shows Lewis [sic] Goldberg living in a boarding house run by Arthur Chauncey in Beaumont. Louis Goldberg was a book-keeper for a newspaper. The 1910 U.S. Census shows Lewis as the 18-year old son of David and Rachel Goldberg, who lived in Lufkin, Texas. David Goldberg was a 49-year old German-born restaurant keeper. Rachel Goldberg was 44, had been born in Germany, and had no occupation listed. Lewis had no occupation listed. The family had apparently lived in Michigan at some point - their oldest daughter, Dollie, had been born there. The 1900 U.S. Census shows Lewis as the 8-year old son of David and Rachel Goldberg, who were living in Nacogdoches, Texas. This census report shows David Goldberg as having been born in Poland; he was a merchant.

Maude Goldberg died in 1954; Louis Goldberg remarried – his second wife's name was Annette. He retired from the newspaper in 1966 and died in Austin June 15, 1973.

Historical Narrative,

402 East 34th Street, Austin, TX 787 05

We believe our home is worthy of preservation and meets the criteria for nomination for a historic designation, as specified below.

The building itself is a Craftsman (Bungaloid) style home built in 1927, which retains many of its original features and characteristics. As such, it is a very fine example of classic 1920s architecture in a style which was very popular at the time and representative of architecture typical to Austin at that point in history. Pictures are enclosed.

The Craftsman as a distinctive building style became popular between 1905 to late 1920s and was primarily influenced by the work of architects Charles S and Henry M Greene of California (source: The Texas State Historical Association). It spread through pattern books and popular magazines and became one of the most popular designs for smaller houses.

The property has been pristinely maintained and its original characteristics and features preserved. As such, it contributes to the historic character and cultural identity of our neighborhood (and city) and, we believe, also adds artistic value.

Features typical of the Craftsman, beautifully present in the building, are a low pitch roof (side gabled), tall, narrow, grouped windows, (double hung) with original glass in many windows, and clapboard outside walls. The property retains its original structure, with one early addition on the back of the home (kitchen area) of unknown dating, but likely 1940s. A separate garage building has also been added, again date is unknown, but it is in keeping with the style and appearance of the main building and not visible from the street. Inside the house has its original long leaf pine floors, original French doors and original fireplace.

The house has a rich history in regards to its past occupants, and it has been a joy to research and learn about their lives and achievements. Most notably, the first owner of the home, residing here 1927-1955, was Louis Nathan Goldberg (1892-1973), former Publisher of the American Statesman. He lived here with his wife Maud.

Goldberg, a native of Nacogdoches, started as cashier of The American Statesman, became business manager in 1929 and Publisher in 1953. His service to The American Statesman has been described as "significant and lasting". Goldberg was also Vice President of Newspapers Inc., which operated Austin, Waco, Port Arthur and Lufkin newspapers. He retired as Publisher in 1966. He was a well known civic leader in Austin and also served as President for the Austin Chamber of Commerce, where his community development endeavors included the areas of agriculture, education, public health, highways and city planning. He was also on the Lay Board of St. Edward's University, serving as the

National Development Chairman for the school. In addition, he was an active member of many groups including Congregation Temple Beth Israel, the Austin Lodge No. 12 AF & AM, Scottish Rite Bodies, president of Ben Hur Shrine, the Rotary and a member of the Salvation Army advisory committee.

I have enclosed many news clippings for Goldberg that discusses his many interesting achievements. Quoting the Austin American Statesman, March 1, 1966:

"As an executive of the American Statesman, Goldberg has seen Austin grow from a small town to a city of national reputation, and the American Statesman from a correspondingly small daily to one of the state's major newspapers. Goldberg has been identified with many civic endeavors both as a newspaper executive and as a private citizen".

Goldberg passed away in June 1973 and is buried in Beth Israel Cemetery, which is inside Oakwood Cemetery and the oldest cemetery in the city of Austin. He had a daughter, Regina Goldberg Leon, who passed away in a car accident in 1974. Louis Goldberg was also survived by his second wife Annette Goldberg (an article featuring her is also enclosed), two stepdaughters, eight grandchildren, one great-grandchild and a niece.
