Proposed Name for the Park (Facility): Arnulfo Alonso Zilker Park Clubhouse

If proposing the name of an individual, include a biographical description of nominee:

Born in Mexico City July 18, 1933 to Sebastian Alonso from Spain and Maria Antonia Alonso from Mexico. Both of his parents were military nurses. When he was 13 years old his mother died which caused him to run away from the boarding school where he had lived. Coming to the United States by way of the Yucatan he arrived in San Antonio and even worked in places as far away as Chicago and New York. By age 17 he settled in Austin where he met his wife Catherine. It was at that point that he sought his US citizenship by serving 2 years in the Mexican Army where he earned the rank of Sergeant. Arnulfo and Catherine (deceased) have 4 daughters (Laura, Mary, Yolanda, and Michelle who live in the Austin area) and 1 son, Arnulfo, who served in the US Army and died in a jeep accident.

Arnulfo Alonso Sr. died in Austin, Texas on August 25, 1999 at the age of 66.

Describe the individual's connection to the park or park system, if any:

Arnulfo Alonso was the longest serving Zilker Park employee (40 years) having been hired by Park Manager Buster Robinson in 1959 and faithfully working there until his death in 1999. (the Barton Springs Bathhouse is named for Buster Robinson, the second longest Zilker employee, for his 35 years of service) Mr. Alonso's skills were incomparable whether the project at hand needed a carpenter, plumber, electrician, welder, mason, irrigator, or mechanic. He could do it all. In addition to cleaning Barton Springs Pool weekly, repairing park infrastructure, and building such Austin landmarks as the Oriental Garden he was the caretaker for 40 years of the Zilker Clubhouse overlooking the city. He cleaned that popular rental space, opened and closed the building for reservations, and was required to live on site in order to assure quick customer response. His gift to the City and to its park, pool, clubhouse, and special event patrons was himself – totally, capably, and gladly. Without him, Zilker Park would not be the park she is.

When asked about Arnulfo Alonso, Jack said:

"He was hired by my father and was a fine man. It makes you realize that many of the people that come across the water are very talented people.

I swear if Alonso had had the opportunity to go to engineering school he would have been one of the best engineers we would have had in the country. He was that way. He could do anything – absolutely.

He built that little office at the corner of the Bathhouse that nobody likes now. That was the first year I was Director there and I had him build that.

But he could do anything – masonry work, carpentry work, repair tractors. You name it, he could do it."

Alonso served with distinction for 40 years from 1959 until his death in 1999. Arnulfo Alonso's four decades of hard work and dedication will be evident to many generations of Austinites to come as they visit Zilker Park, the crown jewel of the Austin Park system.

In closing, the character of an individual is weighed in large part by the impact they have on others that they serve. I was most fortunate to be associated with both of these Park professionals. Their impact on the City of Austin and its citizens will be forever remembered.

Employed by City of Austin 1972-1978 working several of those years at Barton Springs Pool as Lifeguard and Cashier.

Retired from State of Texas (1981-2011). Served as Director of Business Services and Ports of Entry/Excise Tax at time of retirement from the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

I wanted to share my thought on Arnulfo Alonzo whom I worked closely with for several years. This was one of the most talented men I have ever been associated with. He had an incredible ability to design and build various infrastructures needed for Barton Springs Pool. He designed a removable fence system for upper and lower dams that allowed pool staff to easily lift and remove during severe flooding. He engineered a buoy system for protecting swimmers from the lower dam spillway's precarious current. Arnulfo worked hundreds of hours of overtime helping us clean the pool and repair damages after floods. In those days we cleaned the pool at night usually finishing up somewhere around midnight. Arnulfo would often be there driving a tractor hauling large pieces of debris for us even though he'd already put in a full day of work. His work ethic was superior from my perspective as I never saw him take a break or slow down during his shifts.

He helped some us on Saturdays work on our cars as we could not always afford to take them to a repair shop. He would show up with his own tools and generally be able to fix most problems in a short period of time. I'll always have a deep respect for his abilities and successes as limited as his educational opportunities likely were. I being in college at the time had far less usable knowledge and talents than he and was grateful that I was able to learn so much by simply watching and observing him in action. He was a wonderful human being in his abilities, generosity and work ethic. I think naming the Clubhouse in honor of him would be a great for the City.



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


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
