The Texas Constitution, Article 7, Sect. 1

A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools.

In 2012, just 44.2 percent of Texas public schools met No Child Left Behind adequate yearly progress standards. The state didn't release 2013 results because it was seeking the waiver.*

No Child Left Behind took effect in 2002 with the goal of making all children proficient in math and reading by 2014. *

The U.S. Education Department excused Texas from the most strenuous requirements of the Bush-era No Child Left Behind law, granting the state a reprieve from some of the standardized testing-based accountability standards it helped pioneer.*

There are 892 schools that are on the Public Education Grant list, which means either:

- 1) 50% or more of their students did not pass any of the state assessment subjects for two years,
- 2) 2) the school is rated "Improvement Required" or
- 3) 3) the school is rated "Academically Unacceptable."*

In the 2006 semester, 162,597 Texas students were enrolled in remedial classes at public higher education institutions. Such remediation cost \$206 million in General Revenue in the 2006-07 biennium.^{*}
