# HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION FEBRUARY 23, 2015 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2014-1131 4807 AND 4809 HARMON AVENUE

### **PROPOSAL**

Demolish a two ca. 1950 houses.

#### ARCHITECTURE

The house at 4807 Harmon Avenue is a one-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled frame house with a central, shed-roofed entry hood on ornamental metal posts; metal-framed casement windows.

The house at 4809 Harmon Avenue is a one-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled frame house with a full-width, shed-roofed, independent porch; single and paired 6:6 fenestration.

#### RESEARCH

The house at 4807 Harmon Avenue was built in 1950; the first owner and occupant of the house was Helen C. Smith, a widow, who worked as a receptionist and clerk at the General Land Office. There is little information about Helen Smith – unfortunately, there was another Helen C. Smith in Austin at the same time, also a widow, and the available information referencing Helen C. Smith concerns the one that was not married to a man named John. Helen Smith retired from her job at the General Land Office in the mid-1960s, and lived in this house until around 1990.


The house at 4809 Harmon Avenue was also built in 1950; it was owned and occupied by Herman and Leta Morisey through the early 1990s. Herman Morisey was a repairman for the City Electric Department for many years; he retired in the early 1970s. Leta Morisey worked as a telephone operator and clerk for the State Railroad Commission through the 1960s. They had several children; all had clerking jobs.

### STAFF COMMENTS

Neither house appears in any City survey.

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage retention of the houses and the construction of additions if feasible; neither house qualifies as a historic landmark, and although this section of Harmon Avenue has several new 2-story houses and apartment complexes, the numbered streets running between Harmon Avenue and Airport Boulevard are relatively untouched and comprise a neighborhood of post-World War II single-story frame houses much like these. These houses represent the typical residential construction in the neighborhood, and as such, contribute to the character of this 1940s-1950s neighborhood. Careful consideration should be given to whether removal is necessary, or if they can be incorporated into the applicant's proposed development scheme. If rehabilitation and re-use of these houses is not feasible, then staff recommends relocation over demolition, but release of the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.

### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES**

### Herman and Leta Morisey (ca. 1950 – ca. 1993)

Herman Morisey appears in the 1930 U.S. Census as a roomer in the home of G.M. and Della Taylor at 206 W. 7<sup>th</sup> Street in Austin. He was 25, single, had been born in Arkansas, and was a lineman for the telephone company. The 1940 U.S. Census shows Herman and Leta Morisey renting a house in Johnson City, Blanco County, Texas. Herman Morisey was a 35-year old lineman for the LCRA; Leta Morisey was 30, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 3 children: Joann, 7; Dorothy, 5; and Freddie, 3. The family had lived in rural Blanco County in 1935.

# Leta Bell Morisey

Leta Bell Morisey, 76, of Austin died Wednesday.

A member of First Cumberland Presbyterian Church since 1928, she was employed by the State Railroad Commission until her retirement in 1970.

Funeral services will be held at 10:00 AM, Friday in the Colonial Chapel of the Cook-Walden Funeral Home, with Reverend Charles Hughes, Pastor, First Cumberland Presbyterian Church, officiating. Interment will be in Capital Memorial Gardens.
