PROPOSAL

Construct a 2nd story addition to a contributing house; demolish existing sunroom addition and replace with extended living area.

PROJECT SPECIFICATIONS

The applicant proposes to construct a second-story addition to the existing clay-tile International style house. The proposed addition will be flat-roofed, with two sections, both cube-like. The proposed addition will have cement-board siding and trim and aluminumclad windows. The style is contemporary. It appears that the height of the addition will exceed the height of the original house.

STANDARDS FOR REVIEW

The Old West Austin National Register Historic District has no design guidelines for additions. General design principles for historic district stress that additions should be compatible with the existing house and the contributing structures within the district in terms of scale, massing, materials, floor-to-ceiling ratios, and fenestration patterns.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house is a very good example of the International Style on a relatively modest scale. Further, the house is constructed of clay tile, and the original owner of the house, Professor Wayne E. Long of the University of Texas, had published a pamphlet on the thermal characteristics of ceramic walls, and was an expert in thermoscience, air conditioning, and environmental engineering. Staff applauds the applicant for keeping the original materials of the house, as they possibly represent an innovation in building materials that the first owner championed in keeping a house cool in Austin's climate.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The proposed addition is far too tall and overwhelming for this house, and should be scaled back in terms of height and placement on the house; the applicant should also consider a fenestration patterns more compatible with the International Style fenestration on the existing house. Staff recommends reducing the height of the addition, and considering a different fenestration pattern for the proposed addition, as well as pulling the front of the addition back as far as possible from the front of the house, and to complete a City of Austin Documentation Package consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, prior to release of the permit.

Wayne E. and Edna Long (ca. 1948 – ca. 1971)

Wayne E. Long was a professor of mechanical engineering at the University of Texas. In 1951, he wrote a pamphlet for the Clay Products Association of the Southwest entitled "Thermal Characteristics of Ceramic Walls."

WAYNE E. LONG

Wayne E. Long, professor emeritus of mechanical engineering, died on April 5, 1978. He was 73.

Professor Long was born on July 19, 1904, in Chisholm, Texas. He earned bachelor's and master's degrees at Texas A&M University in 1927 and 1935, respectively.

Professor Long taught at Texas Tech University from 1928 to 1930, and at Texas A&M University from 1930 to 1948. He joined the faculty of The University of Texas at Austin in 1948, where he taught until 1971, when he retired. His research interests included thermoscience, air conditioning, and environmental engineering.

Professor Long served as a consultant to the dean of engineering at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, in 1953-54 and again in 1957. He also worked on a low-cost housing project for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.
