PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1948 house.

ARCHITECTURE

Two-story, wing-and-gable stone-veneered frame house with a partial-width inset porch on both the ground and second stories; single and double 1:1 fenestration; metal roof.

RESEARCH

The house was built in 1948 by Engineering Contractors, Inc. for Carrie Blackshear, the widow of Robert K. Blackshear, an oil and refinery executive in Corsicana, Texas. Mrs. Blackshear rented the house out until around 1957, when she moved in. Her first tenants were Sol and Esther Norman, a Jewish couple. Sol Norman owned Lone Star Auto Parts in Austin; the Normans lived here from around 1948 until around 1950. Sol Norman was later tragically killed when his truck, carrying auto supplies, blew a tire and crushed him on a road near Temple, Texas.

Walter Bremond, III and his wife, Zenobia, rented the house in the early 1950s; he was an assistant vice-president of Capital National Bank, one of the family businesses, when he lived here. The house was listed as vacant in the 1955 city directory; from around 1957 to around 1965, Carrie Blackshear moved back in. She had no occupation listed in the city directories while she lived here, but census records show that she had been a housemother at a boarding house on 19th Street (now MLK Boulevard) in 1940, and in 1930, a dressmaker in Corsicana, where one of her daughters was a public school teacher; she also had 6 lodgers in her home in Corsicana, all public school teachers. Mrs. Blackshear lived here until around 1965. A supervisor for the Texas Employment Commission and a retired couple are shown as the owners and occupants through the mid-1970s; the house was later rented by Geoffrey W. Torrence, a computer science engineer at the University of Texas.


STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage adaptive re-use of the house if feasible; while not a good candidate for landmark designation, the house has a classic Texas style and represents the original vision for Tarrytown. If re-use of the house is not feasible, then staff recommends release of the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Sol and Esther Norman (ca. 1948 – ca. 1950)

According to his 1955 death certificate, Sol Norman was born in 1904 in Conneaut, Ohio and died July 14, 1955 in in an automobile accident at Academy, Bell County, Texas. He was living at 711 W. 21st Street in Austin at the time of his death. The 1930 U.S. Census shows Sol Norman as the 25-year old son of Hyman and Fannie Norman, who rented a house in Louisville, Kentucky. Sol Norman had been born in Ohio and was in the family business of auto wrecking. His father had been born in Romania; his mother had been born in Poland and spoke Hebrew.



Carrie Blackshear (ca. 1957 – ca. 1965)

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Carrie Blackshear as the renter of an apartment at 304 W. 19th Street in Austin. She was a 53-year old Texas-born widow who was a housemother at a boarding house. The 1930 U.S. Census shows Carrie Blackshear as the renter of a house in

Corsicana, Texas, with her daughters Elizabeth, 20; and Mary, 14. Carrie Blackshear was a dressmaker. Her daughter Elizabeth was a public school teacher. They had 6 lodgers, all public school teachers. Corsicana city directories for the late 1910s and early 1920s show that Robert K. Blackshear was the vice-president of the Corsicana Oil and Refining Company.
