





# Social Services Return on Investment/Cost Avoidance

- \$4.10 \$9.20 for every \$1 invested in Early Childhood services
- Up to 17% annual return on investment over 20 years for Workforce Development training
- High School graduates will earn almost \$500,000 more in their lifetime than someone who drops out of school

- \$8,509 saved for each schizophrenia treatment avoided
- \$37,000 saved annually for each premature institutionalization in a publicly supporting nursing home avoided
- \$44,000 saved annually for each person exiting or avoiding homelessness

## **Success Stories**

- Capital IDEA Since the program began in 1998, over 1,040
  participants have entered the Central Texas workforce. Average
  starting wages of nearly \$40,000 a year, which is about three times
  their annual earnings when they entered the program.
- Front Steps has provided 54 units of Permanent Supportive Housing using the Housing First model. Averaging a 70% retention rate and success housing hardest to serve: criminal histories, poor rental/utility histories, mental illness and addiction backgrounds.
