Who We Are

- Created in 1967 as Austin Travis County Mental Health and Mental Retardation, 1 of 39 community centers in Texas
- Unit of local government under Chapter 534 of Texas Health and Safety Code
- Governed by a 9 member Board of Trustees appointed in equal numbers by Austin City Council, Travis County Commissioners and Central Health Board of Managers
- Designated local authority for Travis County in areas of behavioral health (mental health and substance use) and intellectual and developmental disabilities





Who We Serve

- Anyone experiencing a psychiatric crisis
- Individuals with Serious Mental Illness
 - Top diagnoses: Schizophrenia, Bi-polar, Major Depression
 - Others served based on agency capacity
- Individuals with Substance Use Disorder
- Individuals with Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities
- Individuals with dual diagnoses

Eligibility based on ability to function, not income

Policy Considerations

19% of Adults and 20% of Children experienced a diagnosable mental disorder (including addiction) in the past year in Travis County and 33% of individuals experiencing homelessness also live with a mental illness

- Rapid population growth people moving here need behavioral health services and funding has not kept pace with local growth
- Large Events cause a spike in demand for services
- Permanent Supported and Affordable Housing are a essential to address need
- Children's Mental Health Plan opportunities to support prevention
- Substance Use Plan under development significantly underfunded area
