

Proposed judicial appointment process

For evaluation of applicants who are not currently serving as a Austin Municipal Court judge or part-time judges applying for full-time positions

Need for additional judges

- Retirement of Judge Vasquez
- Shortage of part-time judges who can work weekdays/weekend nights
- Expanding role of designated juvenile judge

Requesting appointment of:

1 full-time judge to replace Judge Vasquez

3 more part-time judges (only paid when they work)

Expand the role of the juvenile judge to 29 hours per week or appoint as a full time position (utilizing money from existing court fund earmarked for juvenile programs)

=NO ADDITION TO THE COURT'S BUDGET

City Council holds appointment authority

- ♦ Article VI, Section 2 of the City Charter gives City Council the power to appoint judges.
- ◆ In the past, the Judicial Committee (now absorbed into the Public Safety Committee) reviewed the applicants and presented a slate of judges to the full Council for appointment.
- ♦ There is currently no set method for vetting candidates.

Posting the openings

- The presiding judge with input from the other municipal judges will develop a candidate questionnaire
- The questionnaire, updated job description, and application will be provided to City HR
- These materials will be posted by HR on the Austincityjobs.org web site and other social media

Application Process

- Posting should be a **minimum of 30 days**
- City HR will collect applications and screen for the following requirements:
 - Two years residency in City Limits (charter requirement)
 - Licensed in good standing to practice law in Texas
 - Preferred 5 years experience in the practice of criminal law. Minimum two years.
- HR will forward the qualified applications and attendant questionnaires to the presiding judge and any members of the Public Safety Committee who want to review this information.

Competency and Judicial temperament

Evaluation Panel

- The presiding judge will assemble a panel including:
 - 4 or more municipal, county and/or district court judges
 - Director of the Austin Criminal Defense Lawyers Association
 - 1 or more prosecutors
 - and other relevant stakeholders
- Depending on the number of candidates with the minimum qualifications, the panel may rank the applications and interview the 10 highest ranked candidates.
- Candidates will be interviewed by the panel with emphasis on experience, knowledge and potential judicial temperament.

Panel Recommendations

- The presiding judge will draft a summary of the panel's recommendations including the names of those participating.
- ◆ After considering all information, the Public Safety Committee may accept the panel recommendations or conduct additional interviews.
- When the Public Safety Committee has an agreed upon slate of judges, it will be presented to the full Council via an appointment ordinance for a vote.
