Additional Backup Information

The City of Austin Parks and Recreation Department (PARD) manages five historic cemeteries comprising more than 60,000 burials. The Historic Cemeteries Master Plan provides a long-term framework for the management and rehabilitation of the five municipally owned cemeteries within the City: Oakwood Cemetery, Oakwood Cemetery Annex, Plummers Cemetery, Evergreen Cemetery, and Austin Memorial Park Cemetery. This plan documents how these cemeteries developed over time; examines the current condition of historical, cultural, natural, and built resources within each cemetery; identifies and prioritizes challenges and needs; recommends treatment options; and presents a guide for implementing those recommendations.

Update on Resolution No. 20131017-042 – Cemetery Ornamentation:

In 2013, City Council passed Resolution No. 20131017-042, directing the City Manager to conduct a public engagement process to evaluate cemetery rules, in particular, existing rules that govern grave ornamentation. The resolution directed the city to implement a policy allowing ornamentation that is appropriately sensitive to personal and cultural expressions of grief within the boundaries of a burial plot, subject to applicable laws allowing removal for health and/or safety reasons, and pending the outcome of a stakeholder process and final policy direction from the City Council. PARD notified City Council in a July 31, 2014, memo that the department recommended integration of the rules review process into the larger cemetery master planning process. The Historic Cemeteries Master Plan provides an important foundation that will serve as a basis for a revision of the Cemetery Rules and Regulations. Following adoption of the Historic Cemeteries Master Plan, PARD will begin a comprehensive review of the Cemetery Rules and Regulations, which will include further public engagement.
