COA Service Area

- 273 square miles of City of Austin service area

FY 15 DEPARTMENT GOALS

Prevent fire deaths and property loss

- Reduce fire deaths to zero.
- Clear by arrest at least 35% of arson cases.
- Increase the number of non-technical inspections performed by 5%.
- Install at least 6 smoke alarms per day – 2,190 annually.

Prepare for emergencies

- More than 90% of sworn positions fully staffed.
- Provide more than 150 public safety education events.
- More than 90% of sworn personnel will achieve the department certification goals by rank.

Respond efficiently and effectively to emergencies

- Response time from receipt of call to arrival is 8 minutes or less.
- At least 40% of cardiac arrest cases arrive at the hospital with a pulse.
- Confine 85% of structure fires to room of origin.
- More than 98% of all unit responses in the City of Austin will be handled by AFD units.



Budget

- FY16 budget is \$175.2 million
Represents 19.5% of the general fund
- Other sources of funding:
 - \$5.4 million from ABIA for fire protection
 - \$400K from ESDs for dispatch services
 - \$2.9M from Development inspections & special events
 - \$450K from City of Sunset Valley fire contract



OPERATIONS

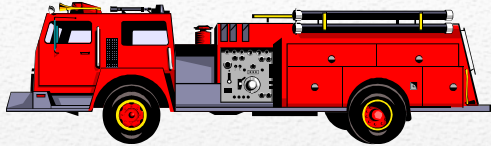
- Primary provider of fire protection for the citizens of Austin
- Largest section of the Fire Department
- Operations' firefighters are on duty at fire stations 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days of the year.
- Firefighters work at the fire stations 24 hours “on” & 48 hours “off”

SERVICES PROVIDED BY OPERATIONS

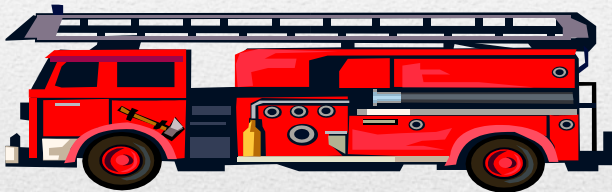
- **Fire Response:** Structure, high-rise, wildfire, vehicle, and aircraft
- **First Responders:** Medical
- **Rescues:** Vehicle, water, confined space, technical, building collapse, and wilderness

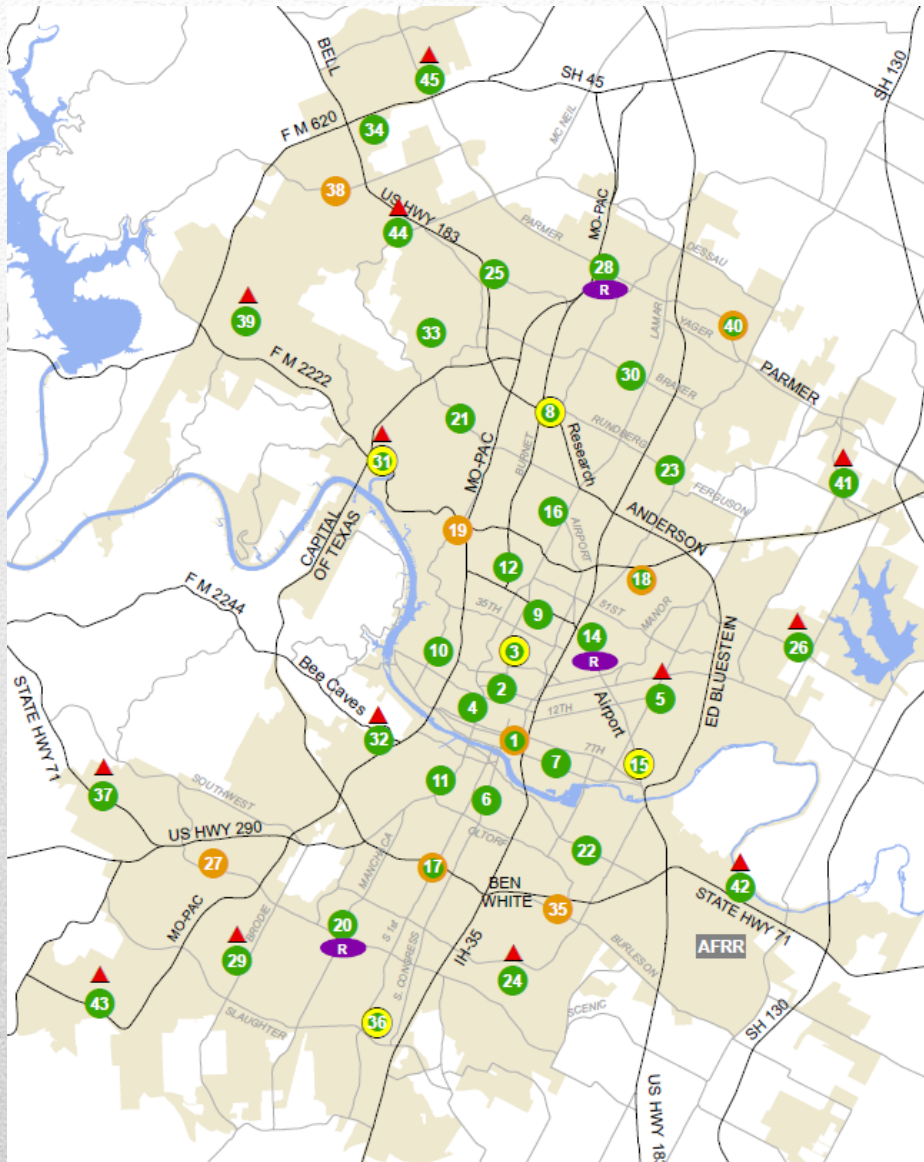

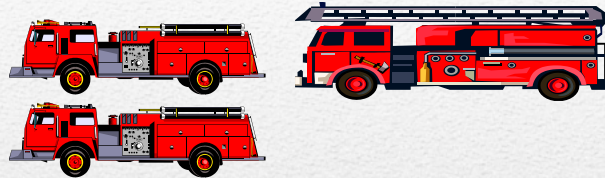

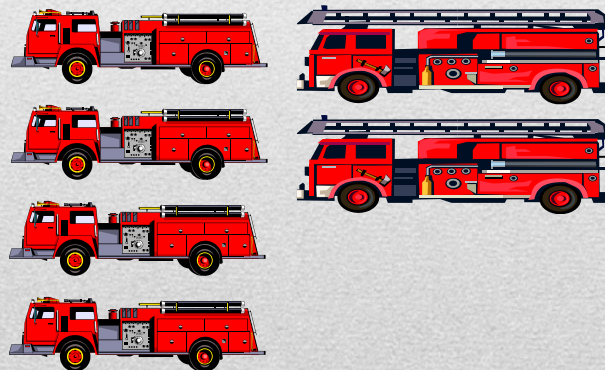

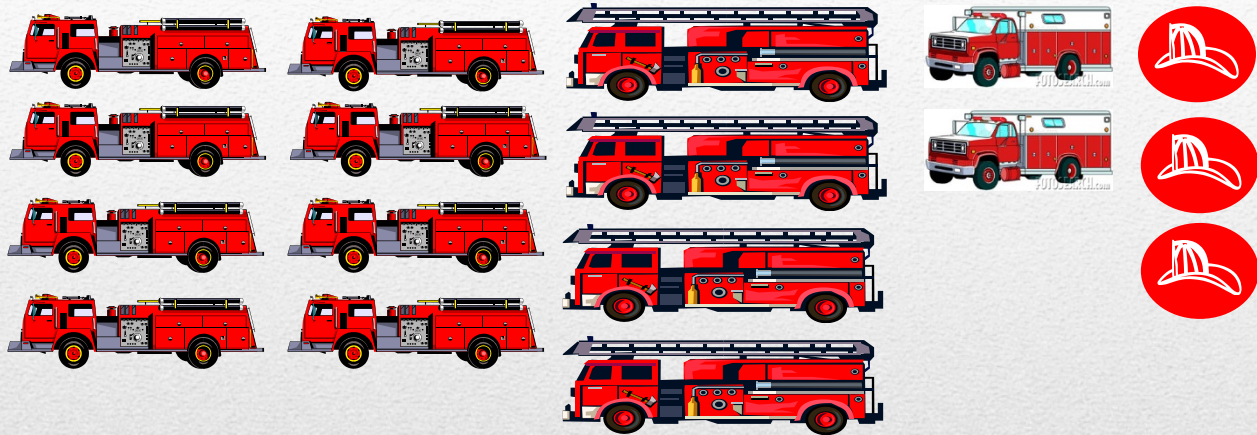

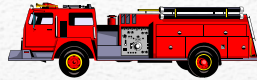

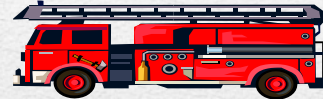

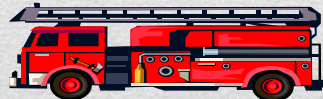
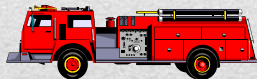
Vehicle Rescue

OPERATIONS – FACTS

- Responds to more than **89,000 incidents** per year. Of those, 70% are medical first response
- Keeps fire to the room of origin **83% of the time!**
- **Station 1**, located downtown, is the busiest station with over 9,300 runs per year
- **Engine 18**, located at Berkman Dr. & US 290 East, is the busiest unit with over 5,252 runs per year
- 100% of Operations' firefighters are wild land certified to the basic national standard level wild land.

PREVENTION - FACTS

- Review of more than **45,000** pages of site plans, permits, and fire protection plans.
- Review of approximately **45 plans** for new high-rise buildings (*38 completed/near completion and 7 in preliminary discussions*)
- More than **30,000** Fire and Life Safety Inspections annually
- Generally, there are more than **300 days** of Special Events, consisting of the reviewing and inspection of more than **700 events**, attended by over **8 million** people from over 82 foreign countries.
- Oversight for the maintenance of more than **24,000** municipal fire hydrants

Community Risk Reduction can be defined as:

Steps, programs, or actions to reduce fire and emergency risks in a community.

Hoping to accomplish:

- Zero fire deaths
- Lower call volume
- Increase the number of homes with smoke alarms
- Increase the number of residents who are prepared



COMMUNITY OUTREACH - FACTS

Every year on average, Community Outreach organizes:

- **600** Fire truck appearances at schools and community events
- **12** smoke alarm canvassing initiatives benefitting **400** homes in need of a working smoke alarm or batteries for the existing smoke alarm
- **2,486** smoke alarm installations, including **260 Hearing Impaired** alarms, through our free smoke alarm program
- Fire safety messages conveyed to over **149,000** citizens of Austin.
