Thank you for your correspondence describing the above-referenced project. This letter presents the comments of the Executive Director of the Texas Historical Commission, the state agency responsible for administering the Antiquities Code of Texas.

The review staff, led by Tiffany Osburn and Elizabeth Brummett, has completed its review of the Phase II schematic design drawings for improvements to Republic Square, which were received on July 15, 2015. Republic Square Park is historically significant primarily for its relationship to the original platting of the City of Austin, as the site of the auction of city lots and one of four designated public squares. We appreciate that the Auction Oaks are a prominent feature of the proposed design and that, while the design responds to the pedestrian plaza at the federal courthouse, the park will retain a distinct western edge and read as an independent square. Given that the park has undergone considerable changes and retains few historic features, as noted in the Republic Square Master Plan, the Division of Architecture has no further comments regarding the design.

No archeological survey will be required in areas where ground disturbance does not exceed three feet below curb level. In the event that historical structures, features, or artifacts are discovered during construction, work in the vicinity should cease and the Archeology Division at the Texas Historical Commission should be contacted immediately.

We look forward to further consultation with your office and hope to maintain a partnership that will foster effective historic preservation. Thank you for your cooperation in this state review process, and for your efforts to preserve the irreplaceable heritage of Texas. Attachment Part 1A Project Description

Austin Parks Foundation is at the forefront of an effort to honor Republic Square's historic past and elevate its status beyond a special events space to an important, community gathering-place in the heart of downtown Austin.

Beginning in 2012, a collaborative process led by Austin Parks Foundation, PARD and the Downtown Austin Alliance solicited input from community stakeholders to guide the design consultants, Design Workshop, in planning for this important public space. Planning resulted in several priorities for Republic Square's future:

- Aesthetics that reflect the character and spirit of downtown Austin
- Preservation of the historic features and celebration of park history
- A programming plan that balances planned activities and informal park use
- A sustainable ongoing maintenance and operations plan

The redevelopment of Republic Square will be based around a circular promenade which connects pedestrians to all four corners of the park, creates dynamic edge conditions and provides a flexible, central lawn for activities. Regional materials will be used for the hardscape, which is inspired by the layering of local creeks and waterways. Below are some of the areas of focus:

Auction Oaks

The existing deck (which also serves as a stage oriented toward the main lawn) and interpretive materials related to the Auction Oaks will be preserved, and a series of low, curved walls following the circular pattern of the park will provide new seating.

Arc Promenade

The arc promenade area will provide generous space for strolling, seating on almost all edges, park furnishings and interesting views across the park.

• Plaza

The plaza area connects Republic Square Park to the Federal Courthouse plaza, and is a flexible space that can accommodate events such as the farmers' market, but also includes café-style seating for a future food concession.

Market

The market area includes spaces intended for both event use and daily community use. It can accommodate seating and support informal programming such as games or a mobile library cart.

Amenities

Modest structures which blend into the park setting will increase park amenities. A food kiosk will offer food sales to park visitors, while a support building will provide public restrooms, park storage and maintenance support.

Attachments Part 1B - Tourism Justification

Since the campaign to return Republic Square to its original intent in 1974, the park has become a hub of tourist activity and has served as one of the main thoroughfares for huge annual events that consistently bring tourists from around the country, and the globe.

Republic Square played host to four separate evening events at the 2015 Food & Wine Festival including two Rock Your Taco Showdown nights, and two Taste of Texas evenings, both of which included live music and were attended by multiple nationally-known chefs. The festival brought in nearly 9,000 attendees, including celebrity chefs like Andrew Zimmern and other food network personalities.

The park has also been an important public art space for the ever-popular SXSW for many years. In 2015 Republic Square was the site of the Eco Light Garden, and part of SXSW exhibitions, which saw over 22,000 participants and helped SXSW book over 12,000 individual hotel reservations. Republic Square was also the venue for one of the official SXSW Film screenings—Bikes vs Cars. SXSW brings over 400,000 people to our city every year, meaning Republic Square Park could play an even larger role in the festival once renovations are complete.

Perhaps some of the highest traffic to Republic Square Park comes during the two weekends of ACL Music Festival when the park is used as a shuttle stop and meeting area before and after the festival. ACL Music Festival brings 450,000 people to Austin, including nationally and internationally recognized talent, as well as hundreds of thousands of festivalgoers. The potential for a more engaging use of this space is even higher when you consider the proposed improvements.

In addition to playing host for these large annual events Republic Square has also been the site of some smaller one-time and multi-year events such as the annual AIDS Walk (which draws participants from neighboring counties and cities), multiple outdoor movie screenings, including Austin Parks Foundation's Movies in the Park Program, Austin PRIDE (Republic Square is the end of the parade route making it the gathering place for thousands of revelers from all over the state, and performers from all over the world), and many others.

Not only is Republic Square an important location for these pre-planned events, the proposed renovations will allow the park to stand on its own as an outdoor venue for concerts, and other live performances. Since Republic Square sits in the heart of downtown, moments from some our cities other great amenities, and just steps from great hotels, restaurants and bars, it's not only a possibility, but a likelihood that Republic Square will become a sought after venue that will generate more tourist activity in the downtown area than ever before.

Attachments Part 2 - Historical Documentation

On August 1, 1839, under the shade of a grove of oak trees—now known as the Auction Oaks— in what is now Republic Square, the original 306 lots of the newly-surveyed town of Austin were sold at auction. Excluded from sale were four unnamed public squares, which were to be preserved as gathering places for the citizens of the fledgling town.

Located at the convergence of Guadalupe Street, West Fifth Street, San Antonio Street and West Fourth Street, Republic Square is one of three remaining historical squares in the heart of downtown Austin. The park has been known by different names throughout its history, including "Courthouse Square," "Hemphill Square," "Mexican Park," and "Guadalupe Park."


In the late 1800's and early 1900's, the park had strong associations with Austin's Mexican-American and Catholic populations, due to its proximity to Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church and parochial school, and the concentration of Hispanic citizens in the surrounding neighborhoods. By the 1920s and 1930s, residents and Mexican-American cultural events began moving to east Austin. Residences and businesses were soon replaced by warehouses, car lots, lumber yards and printers.


From the 1950s through the 1970s the park—save for the southwest corner with the historic Auction Oaks—was used as a parking lot. In 1974, the Sierra Club and PARD began discussions of converting the parking lot back to a public park. The restoration began in 1976 as part of the Bicentennial celebration and the current name, Republic Square, was chosen in tribute to the Republic of Texas.

In 1990 Republic Square was first listed in the city's Historic Landmark database as case # C14H-1990-0013. Though it has not yet been designated as an official Recorded Historic Landmark, State Archeologic Landmark, National Register Property or listed within a Local Historic District it is clear that the land, as well as the famed Auction Oaks, play an important part in Austin's history.







THE CAMPAIGN FOR RSP



The total cost of Republic Square Park improvements is \$5.8 million, and more than \$2.5 million in public funds have been earmarked for the project. Austin Parks Foundation is leading the effort to raise the remaining \$3.2 million to ensure that Republic Square becomes a premier urban park that reflects the dynamic spirit of downtown Austin. Included in the fundraising goal is \$1 million in endowment for the future of Republic Square.

As part of the public-private partnership agreement for Republic Square Park, the Downtown Austin Alliance will lead the operations and management of the park, including management of the food vendor, park maintenance and park programming. The Downtown Austin Alliance's leadership in management facilitates future revenue generation, allowing the park to help support itself.
