Subject: Director's Monthly Report to the Zero Waste Advisory Commission

Austin Resource Recovery Year in Review – Top 10 Accomplishments in 2015

- Developed *Construction and Demolition Recycling Ordinance* through a stakeholder process; adopted by City Council Nov. 19, 2015. Starting October 1, 2016, the ordinance impacts approximately 20 percent of the waste generated in Austin by requiring construction projects of 5,000 square feet or more to recycle at least 50 percent of the materials they generate.
- Launched the newly expanded Recycle & Reuse Drop-off Center. The combined center provides
 additional services for residents and creates a more convenient customer experience. The Drop-Off
 Center now accepts Styrofoam containers and packing material, plastic bags and plastic film, all singlestream recyclables and hard plastics. A new webpage and comprehensive brochure help residents
 know what they can drop off and pick up at the facility. (The Drop-Off Center was formerly two
 facilities: the Household Hazardous Waste Facility and the Resource Recovery Center.)
- Launched *Recycle on the Go* downtown recycling initiative. Mayor Steve Adler, Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo and the Downtown Austin Alliance joined City officials to announce the new initiative and unveil nearly 50 new recycling containers in downtown Austin. ARR's outreach team worked with businesses and downtown pedestrians to promote use of the new service.
- Coordinated with the Office of Innovation to launch a new community engagement tool, *Insights*,
 which gained insights from residents about barriers to household recycling. In one month, garnered
 more than 1,500 comments from the public which are being used to form future programs and public
 education and outreach plans.
- Provided outreach to over 3,500 individuals within the business community for property-specific recycling inquiries and related events. Received Annual Diversion Plans from more than 94 percent of properties affected by the Universal Recycling Ordinance.
- Conducted two citywide Recycling Set-Out Audits to identify ARR residential recycling participation
 rates. The audits results indicate that 74.5% of ARR residential customers utilize our curbside recycling
 program. This is a "Best Practice" standard envied by many American cities.
- Conducted ARR Internal Waste Characterization Study (the first of its kind in Texas), to identify ARR's
 Diversion Rate. The study identified a 42% Diversion Rate for ARR Residential customers and noted
 that over 40% of what Austin residents send to the landfill is Recyclable or Reusable.
- Cleaned up more than 2,000 tons of storm debris from the *Memorial Day and Halloween Storm events*

- Collected over 500 tons of trash during South by Southwest Festival (SXSW March 2015)
- Mixed and distributed 26,000 gallons of *Austin ReBlend*, a 100 percent post-consumer, reblended flat paint (with low VOCs) made from paint collected at the Recycle and Reuse Drop-Off Center.

2015 Awards presented to Austin Resource Recovery

- Awarded Star of Texas Alliance for Recycling (STAR) first-place for Outstanding Environmental Public Education and Outreach Program (November 2015).
- Awarded Solid Waste Association of North America (SWANA) Silver Excellence Award in Communication, Education and Marketing Tools (August 2015).
- Awarded Star of Texas Alliance for Recycling (STAR) first-place for Outstanding Environmental Youth Education and Outreach Program for supporting Zero Waste in the next generation, the "Generation Zero" initiative in partnership with Keep Austin Beautiful and Austin public schools (November 2015).
- Austin Resource Recovery & Austin Economic Development Departments received an Excellence in Economic Development Awards in the category of Sustainable & Green Development for Austin Materials Marketplace (Gold Excellence) from the International Economic Development Council (IEDC), a non-profit membership organization serving economic developers internationally (October 2015).

Travis County Interlocal Agreement

Over the last year, the Business Outreach Team has worked with Travis County to complete Site Assessments and create a county Green Team; and now have completed Zero Waste training for more than 90 Green Team county employees. A new plan for the upcoming calendar year is currently in progress.

Actions Taken by City Council since the last ZWAC Meeting

October 28, 2015: ARR briefed the Council Committee on Open Space, Environment, and Sustainability on the draft C&D Recycling ordinance, which was amended to reflect recommendations by ZWAC and the Planning Commission. The amended draft ordinance set the effective date for commercial demolition projects as 10/1/2019, removed the greater diversion requirements that would become effective in 2020 and 2030, and added requirements that staff report to Council on the impact of the ordinance on household affordability and recycling markets. The Council Committee voted to recommend the draft ordinance to the full Council.

November 19, 2015: Council approved the C&D Recycling Ordinance amendments to chapters 15 and 25 of the City Code and to ARR Administrative rules, amending the recommendation by the OSES Council Committee on October 28, 2015. The additional amendment increases the diversion rate requirements in 2020 and 2030 dependent on Council action after consideration of information about existing recycling market studies and impacts to household affordability.

December 10, 2015: Council voted to oppose a 12-month extension of an Austin Energy Class 2 Waste contract for the management and disposal of industrial Class 2 non-hazardous waste. ZWAC voted in opposition of this extension. ARR is assisting Austin Energy in rebidding the waste hauling contract. "Community Values" will be added into the bid selection criteria.

November 19, 2015 and December 10, 2015: Council delayed decision on items involving a land sale for funding of Winnebago Lane property and budget amendment to place funds from sale of that property and lease of Bolm Road property into ARR Capital Improvement Projects budget, and referred the items to the Audit and Finance Committee on January 27th. ZWAC has been asked to review the items for a recommendation to Council.

December 17, 2015: Council approved Trash and Recycling Receptacles Agreement for Downtown streets, as recommended by ZWAC at November meeting.

Recycling MRF Update

The two Recycling MRF processing contracts require a new service schedule through a "reset" period that has recently expired. The new service schedule is under negotiation with the two vendors, and will have a five year term. Negotiations include changing certain operational requirements, as well as a renegotiated pricing structure. The negotiations are anticipated to conclude by January 31st. An update will be provided to ZWAC at the February 10th meeting.

Organics Support Letters

The City Manager and City Council members have received hundreds of letters from citizens requesting the implementation of city-wide residential curbside food-waste collection. The department is formulating an alternative implementation schedule and cost assessment to be discussed with ZWAC at the February 10th meeting.

National Recycling Coalition

Bob Gedert, Austin Resource Recovery Director, has been named president of the National Recycling Coalition. NRC is a nonprofit organization that promotes and enhances recycling in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico. The coalition, founded in 1978, is a network of more than 6,000 members that includes waste reduction, reuse, recycling and composting organizations.
