

Coal	0.56	20%
Nuclear	0.15	5%
Renewable	1.40	51%
ERCOT & Bilateral Purchases	0.86	31%
Green Choice & Bilateral Sales	(0.42)	-15%
Adjustments and Over Recovery	(0.58)	-21%
System Average PSA	2.769	100%

The cost components included in power supply rates vary by utility. Consequently, a comparison of those rates by utility is not an accurate reflection of like costs. Comparing "all in" costs by utility gives a better depiction of competitive rates. The graph below shows a comparison of residential bills at consumption levels of 500, 1000, and 2000 kWh. The comparison uses February 2016 rates and includes Austin Energy's proposed PSA effective April 2016.

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### Additional Answer Information

**QUESTION:** Approximately how many companies in the City of Austin have 15 or more employees and would be impacted by this ordinance? COUNCIL MEMBER ZIMMERMAN'S OFFICE

### **ANSWER:**

1) Initial data pulled from Hoover's Business Data by indicated there are 6,650 businesses with 15+ employees in the city of Austin. Data from the Census Bureau's County Business Patterns indicates there are 8,963 businesses with 10+ employees and 4,997 businesses with 20+ employees. The Census Bureau does not capture businesses with the employment range of 15+ employees.
