Mueller Today (nearing 40% completion):

- Over \$265M under construction or upcoming
- Diversity: wide range of housing types and jobs
- 25% Affordable Housing Required (for sale or for rent)
 - 679 affordable homes (1,475 at completion)
- Almost 5,000 residents (13,000 at completion)
- Almost 5,000 jobs (13,000 at completion)
- Over 80 acres of new parks (140 at completion)
- \$829 M taxable value in 2015 (over \$1.3B at completion)

Current Districts include: Red River 12th Street Manor St.

3 new districts coming in Summer 2016



Promote and support businesses of *all sizes and types* within the city's commercial areas and corridors;

Include a flexible set of tools to assist businesses in the formation of *merchants associations;*

Create ideal conditions for organized commercial districts

A Merchant's Association is a group of businesses (all types) that exists to anchor and stabilize businesses around:

- beautification efforts;
- marketing and promotions; and
- business retention and development activities within a commercial district.

Family Business Loan Program (FBLP)

A low-interest loan program for small businesses creating one job for every \$35,000 in loan funds borrowed.

A Micro loan program focused on chronically unemployed or underemployed.

Music Venue Loan Program (MVLP)

A micro loan program for music venues to improve the acoustic environment for venues and reduce sound levels that impact nearby residents.

Business Retention Enhancement Fund (BRE)

A low-interest loan program for businesses on Congress Avenue and East 6th Street to spur growth and reestablish the area as retail and urban entertainment district destinations.



How We Implement Economic Development Policies:

- Provide training & low-interest loans for small businesses
- Contract for skills training and career development
- Create jobs through performance-based agreements
- Issue citywide contracts to artists and arts organizations

Capital IDEA

A career development program

Helps low-income adults get college degrees so they can get higher paying jobs.

Contract amount: \$1.5M

Graduates 80 adults per year.

165% ROI for the first ten years after graduation.



Economic Development

Einstein Project

 Focus on removing 40,000 children from poverty in ten years by incentivizing science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) education. Ray Marshall Center measuring ROI.


Partnership with Austin Technology Council
