PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1931 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-and-a-half story rectangular-plan cross-gabled frame Tudor Revival-styled cottage with a front-gabled independent porch on brick posts; single and paired 1:1 fenestration; prominent knee braces at the deep eaves; synthetic siding.

RESEARCH

The house appears to have been built in 1931 by Harry G. Malmberg, a widower who had an auto garage near the UT campus on 31st Street. Malmberg and his son, Morgan, lived here until around 1936. The house was then a rental property until around 1960. Tenants included two state legislators: Leonard Westfall, a state representative, and G. Hobart Nelson, a state senator, in the mid-1930s; Christian H. Langdeau, an accountant, and his wife, Juanita, a sales clerk at a downtown ladies' hat shop, in the late 1930s, road contractor Lynn D. Pickett and his wife, Oneta, in the 1940s, and a cook at the Night Hawk Café in the late 1950s.


Sam Goldstein purchased the house around 1960, and lived here until around 1980. Goldstein was a mechanic at an auto body shop before he moved into the house, then worked as the manager of a used car lot in the early 1960s, and for the State Board of Insurance as a reproduction operator, through the late 1970s.

STAFF COMMENTS


The house is listed in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984) but without a priority for research.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use to the greatest extent possible; while modified, the house is a good example of the prevailing Tudor Revival-style architecture that defines Travis Heights. If the Commission votes to release the permit, then staff recommends completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Harry G. Malmberg (ca. 1931 – ca. 1934)

H.G. Malmberg appears in the 1930 U.S. Census as the renter of the house at 105 E. 1st Street in Austin. He was a 30-year old widower who had been born in Texas to Swedish-born parents. He was a mechanic in an auto shop. He had a son, Morgan, 12, who had been born in Texas.

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Harry and Dora Malmberg as the renters of the house at 2105 E. 1st Street in Austin. Harry Malmberg was 23, had been born in Texas to Swedish-born parents, and was the proprietor of an auto garage. Dora Malmberg was 22, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had a son, Morgan, 2.

His 1917 World War I draft registration card shows that Harry Gunner Malmberg was born in Georgetown, Texas in 1896. He was living at 2105 E. 1st Street in Austin and was an auto mechanic. He was tall, with a medium build, hazel eyes, and brown hair.

Oneta Pckett was 31, was born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had lived in rural Lampasas County, Texas.


