Authorize negotiation and execution of a 24-month contract with SAFETEC COMPLIANCE SYSTEMS, INC., or one of the other qualified offerors to Request for Proposals JRD0315, to provide safety data sheet management system and chemical inventory services, in an estimated amount of \$320,000, with three 12-month extension options in an estimated amount of \$160,000 per extension option, for a total contract amount not to exceed \$800,000.

Amount and Source of Funding

Funding in the amount of \$80,000 is available in the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Operating Budget of various City departments. Funding for the remaining 18 months of the original contract period and extension options are contingent upon available funding in future budgets.

Fiscal Note A fiscal note is not required. The Purchasing Office issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) JRD0315 for these services on November 7, 2016 and it closed on December 1, 2016 with four offers received. The **Purchasing** recommended offer is the best evaluated offer submitted by a responsible offeror. Additional Language: information on the solicitation is included below. For the services required for this solicitation, there were no subcontracting opportunities; therefore, no subcontracting goals were established.

Additional Backup Information

The contract will provide the City access to a web-based safety data sheets (SDS, formerly known as material safety data sheet or MSDS) management system and chemical inventory services for hazardous materials and chemicals. A SDS is a standardized way of communicating the identification, composition, handling, properties, and emergency control measures for hazardous chemicals stored in the workplace. The management system will provide the City the ability to access identified SDS' monitor, and develop reports for chemicals located in City facilities. Under chemical inventory services, the contractor will identify and collect information on the chemicals located in City facilities. Access to this data will keep the City in compliance with various federal, state and local regulations.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires public employers to comply with parts of the Occupational Safety Health Act (OSHA) Hazard Communication standard and the EPA Risk Management Plan, which requires employers to keep their workplace free of recognized hazards. OSHA standards are rules that describe the methods that employers must use to protect their employees from hazards. Congress enacted the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act or EPCRA in 1986 to establish requirements for federal, state and local governments, tribes, and industry regarding emergency planning and "community right-to-know" reporting on hazardous and toxic chemicals. The 2003 International Fire Code, as locally amended by the City, requires that businesses storing or using hazardous materials above-ground obtain a permit. This requirement allows the Austin Fire Department to track potential hazards and inform responding firefighters about specific chemical hazards at a certain location. All of these regulations require an inventory by location and updated SDS information, which this system will provide.

This system will streamline data collection, report creation and permit submittals, and provide crucial multi-user access to all City departments. In addition, the contract will provide technical assistance and training, if requested by City users.

The contracts providing SDS services to Austin Water and Fleet Services will expire on April 12, 2017 with average yearly spends of \$49,257 and \$17,670 respectively for each department. The contract providing services to Austin Energy will expire on June 18, 2017, with an average yearly spend of \$17,332. The estimated quantities on this solicitation increased to account for additional departments to join this contract to improve their safety programs.

An evaluation team with expertise in this area evaluated the offers and scored Safetec Compliance Systems, Inc. as the best to provide these services based on the system concept and proposed solution, business organization and project management structure, experience and qualifications, and local business presence.

This request allows for the development of a contract with a qualified offeror selected by Council. If the City is unsuccessful in negotiating a satisfactory contract with the selected offeror, negotiations will cease with that provider and staff will return to Council so that another qualified offeror may be selected, authorizing new contract negotiations.

If a contract is not secured, the City will not have an avenue to efficiently collect, maintain, and report chemical hazard requirements, and therefore, will not be in compliance with federal, state, and local regulations.
