Additional Backup Information						

The Austin Shelter for Women and Children provides continuous emergency shelter, basic needs, specialized counseling, childcare, and educational services for single women and women with dependent children. The 13,328 square-foot facility for the Austin Shelter for Women and Children is located at 4523 Tannehill Lane and the City has recently executed a new 50-year lease with Travis County to operate the facility. The facility is in need of renovations in order to better serve the existing population of homeless women and children, as well as expand services for 32 to 34 additional clients. To address the most critical facility-needs and program expansions, renovations must include a fire suppression system, dining room expansion, Americans with Disabilities Act upgrades, code compliant kitchen ceiling and site improvements, including irrigation, site drainage, tree rehabilitation and planting, a new drive for emergency vehicle access, and a safe walking path. Expansion of the facility will also provide additional sleeping quarters for family groups with older males, an expanded child care facility, and additional parking spaces.
