HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION MAY 22, 2017 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2017-0204 1907 HOLLY STREET

PROPOSAL

Demolish a house that was either built ca. 1913, or moved onto this site in 1971 from an unknown location.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, rectangular-plan, side-gabled to shed-roofed frame house with a front-gabled independent porch on plain wood posts; single 1:1 fenestration with 3:1 wood screens; the porch and doorway are at the third of the four-bay façade.

RESEARCH

It is not clear whether this is the house that dates from 1913, that has always carried this address, or whether this is a house that was moved onto the site in 1971 from an unknown location. City building permit records show that a house was moved onto this site in 1971, and the Sanborn maps of 1922, 1935, and 1962 show a house with a full-width front porch, as opposed to this house, which has what appears to be an original front porch, but one that is only partial-width. The worrisome thing about the building permit record, though, is that it does not reflect the ownership of the property by Pablo and Tommie Quiroz, when their ownership stems from the mid-1950s. The building permit record shows a Jesse Bartlett for the move of the house onto the lot.

If the house is the original to the site, then it appears to date from 1913. The first owners and occupants were George and Alice Middleton, who lived here until around 1921, when George Middleton passed away. George Middleton was a teamster. The house was a rental property throughout the rest of the 1920s and 1930s, until being purchased by Homer and Sallie Langford around 1946. The Langfords had rented the house in the mid-1940s before buying it. Homer Langford was a barber who worked at a variety of downtown barber shops. He and Sallie lived here until around 1952. The house was then a rental property again in the early 1950s, then purchased by Pablo and Tomasa Quiroz in the mid-1950s. The Quiroz family lived here until Tommie Quiroz died in 2013. Pablo Quiroz was born in northern Travis County to Mexican-born farmers. He worked for many years as a mechanic for Jack Stableford Pontiac, until opening his own auto repair business at this house.

STAFF COMMENTS

The East Austin Historical Survey (2016) shows this house as ca. 1914, and eligible as a local landmark and individually eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION


Initiate historic zoning. The house appears to be intact, and meets the criteria for designation for its architecture and historical associations.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

George and Alice Middleton (ca. 1913 – ca. 1921)

The 1920 U.S. Census shows George and Alice Middleton as the owners of this house. George Middleton was 67, had been born in Texas to Alabama-born parents, and was a teamster with his own team. Alice Middleton was 47, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. With them lived a grand-daughter, Inez Schulenburg, 4, who had been born in Texas.

The 1910 U.S. Census shows that George Middleton had been married before. He was living in Precinct 5 of Travis County, and was 58. He was born in Texas and was a laborer doing day work. The census report shows that George Middleton was on his third marriage. His wife's name was Lilly. She was also 58, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. The census reports shows that this was her second marriage, and that she and George had been married for 14 years.

The 1900 U.S. Census shows George Middleton and his wife, Malinda, living on a farm in Williamson County, Texas, where George was a farmer and laborer. Malinda Middleton was born in 1864 in Texas. They had 3 children and 2 boarders living with them. Their children were Maud, born in 1885, Roy, born in 1889, and George, born in 1892. Their boarders were a 40-year old Kentucky-born farm laborer named James Thompson, and a 36-year old Mexican-born farm laborer named Louis Rames.

George Middleton died September 1, 1921. His death certificate shows that he was living at 2010 Garden Street at the time of his death. He was born in 1852 in Texas and was a teamster. There was no obituary in the Austin newspapers.

MRS. ALICE MIDDLETON

Mrs. Alice Middleton, 70, died at a local hospital Thursday at 8:30 p.m. A life-long resident of Austin. Mrs. Middleton had been ill for about a month.

Survivors are five sisters, Mrs. O. F. Pannell of Austin, Mrs. J. C. Chaney, Mrs. John Ross of Dallas, Mrs. G. J. Chittum of Abilene, Mrs. Viola Adcock of Beaumont; one brother, George Waldrop of Austin, Funeral arrangements are incomplete, but will be announced later by Hyltin Funeral home.

Homer Hamilton Lankford registered for the draft during World War I. He was living at Rockdale, Texas, and was born in 1886 at Beaukiss, Texas. He was a farmer for himself in Rockdale. He had a wife and 6 children. He was of medium height and build, and had brown eyes and black hair.

The 1940 U.S. Census shows H.H. and Villa Lankford living in a rented house at 1902 Garden Street in Austin. H.H. Lankford was 52, had been born in Texas, and was a barber. Villa Lankford was 52, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 children listed with them: Louise, 13; and Harvey, 11.

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Homer H. and Villa Lankford living in a rented house on the Thorndale-Conoley Road in Milam County, Texas. Homer H. Lankford was 43, had been born in Texas, and was a farmer. Villa Lankford was 41, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. They had 8 children: Louie, 17, a farm laborer; Aubrey, 15, a farm laborer; Sortie, 13; Mabel, 11; Ruth, 9; Alberta, 6; Louise, 3; and Harvey, 1. All of the children had been born in Texas.


His 1958 death certificate shows that Homer H. Lankford was living at 2306 Willow Street at the time of his death. He was born in 1886 in Texas, and was a barber.


