PROPOSAL

Demolish a ca. 1946 house.

ARCHITECTURE

One-story, L-plan, brick-veneered house with a gabled roof; partial-width inset porch to the left of the projecting front gable; single Colonial Revival-styled fenestration, including an *;8 window in the projecting front gable.

RESEARCH

The house was built by E.J. Hood in 1946; the first occupants were James E. and Marjorie Bridges, who are listed as the renters of the house in the 1947 city directory, and then as the owners in directories of the 1950s. James E. and Marjorie Bridges lived here until around 1955. He was the proprietor of Bridges Furniture Company, at 416 Congress Avenue, a store that was in business from 1946 to 1966. In 1953, he and Marjorie established the Marbridge Foundation near Manchaca; the foundation provides residential services and training for over 200 adults with learning disabilities on what is now a 300-acre campus. From this house, the Bridges moved to 2505 Pecos Street.

The house was then purchased by J. Milton and Mary E. Overstreet, who lived here from around 1955 until Milton's death in 1993. Milton Overstreet was a purchasing agent for the State of Texas.

STAFF COMMENTS

The house is beyond the bounds of any City survey to date.

The house does not meet the criteria for landmark designation as set forth in City Code:

- a. **Architecture.** The house is a brick-veneered post-World War II house with minimal traditional features. The house has no architectural distinction.
- b. **Historical association.** The house was the home of James and Marjorie Bridges for about 9 years, and although the Bridges were noteworthy for their establishment of the Marbridge Foundation in Manchaca, there may be other houses, including the one they moved to in 1955, at 2505 Pecos Street, that have a longer period of significant associations with the Bridges Family. The later owner, Milton Overstreet, does not appear to have any significant historical associations.
- c. **Archaeology.** The house was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d. **Community value.** The house does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
- e. **Landscape feature.** The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:**James E. and Marjorie Bridges (ca. 1946 – ca. 1955)**

1 J. E. BRIDGES, President,
 2 Bridges Furniture Co., Austin. The
 3 Bridges Furniture Co., presenting
 4 a complete line of household
 5 furniture, appliances and carpets,
 6 was organized on March 27, 1946,
 7 with J. E. Bridges as president,
 8 Mrs. James E. Bridges, vice-presi-
 9 dent, and Howard Cox, secretary-
 10 treasurer.

11 Initially employing 10 persons,
 12 the company now employs 25;
 13 the store-proper contains 23,000
 14 square feet of display space, with
 15 10,000 square feet of warehouse
 16 space. In October, 1949, Bridges
 17 bought out Abernathy Furniture
 18 Co. and now is one of the largest
 19 furniture stores in Austin. Many
 20 new innovations have been ad-
 21 ded from time to time to give Aus-
 22 tin the most modern facilities in
 23 home decoration. The latest
 24 among these is the new dec-
 25 orated galleries, offering a com-
 26 plete decorative service with
 27 nationally known brands and
 28 with professional decorators in
 29 charge. The store has recently
 30 been air conditioned throughout.


31 Mr. Bridges was born on Dec.
 32 25, 1907, in Inman, S. C., the son
 33 of Mr. and Mrs. Joe F. Bridges;
 34 his father was a cotton farmer.
 35 He attended public schools at
 36 Inman and Columbia, S. C., and
 37 his first job was as an outside
 38 salesman and collector for a
 39 furniture company in Columbia
 40 in 1927. He was later promoted
 41 to salesman, then to advertising
 42 and display manager, and next
 43 to assistant manager of the store.
 44 From 1936 to 1941 he was man-
 45 ager of a furniture store in Chat-
 46 tanooga, Tenn., and in 1941 trans-
 47 ferred to New Orleans, La., as
 48 store manager, a position he re-

49 signed in 1946 to come to Austin.

50 He was married on Dec. 24,
 51 1927, to Marjorie Davis; they have
 52 one child: James Edgar, Jr. Mrs.
 53 Bridges also acts as saleslady
 54 and decorator for their store.

55 Mr. Bridges is a member of the
 56 Kiwanis Club and chairman of
 57 several club committees, a mem-
 58 ber of the Austin Country Club,
 59 and he lists boating and fishing
 60 at his lodge on Lake Travis as
 61 his hobbies.

J. E. (Ed) Bridges, co-founder and Chairman Emeritus of Marbridge Foundation died June 10, 2001.

Mr. Bridges, a 51 year resident of Austin, established Marbridge Foundation Inc. in Manchaca, Texas, in June 1953, as a private non-profit organization to provide supervised living and training for their son, Jim, and other adults with various cognitive challenges.

Survivors include his wife of 74 years, Margie D. Bridges; and his son, J.E. Bridges Jr.; a brother, Paul Bridges of Charlotte, North Carolina; a sister, Thelma Thorton of Spartanburg, South Carolina; and his beloved nephew, Dr. Roy Campbell of Orangeburg, South Carolina.

The family will receive friends on Wednesday, June 13th from 4:00 until 6:00 p.m. at the Weed Corley-Fish Funeral Home located at 3125 North Lamar in Austin.

Funeral services will be held at 11:00 a.m., Thursday, June 14th in the Marbridge Chapel of Love on Marbridge Ranch located at 2310 Bliss Spillar Rd. in Manchaca led by the Reverend Tom Heger of St. John's Presbyterian Church, Manchaca, Texas. Interment will follow in a private ceremony at the Bridges' family cemetery located on the Marbridge Ranch campus.

Pallbearers will be Ralph Pfluger, Randolph Walker, Chris Winslow, Bob Fullbright, Bob May, and Randy Van Camp. Honorary pallbearers will be all former and current members of the Marbridge Foundation Board of Directors.

James Edgar Bridges was born December 25, 1907 to Joseph F. Bridges and Molly Littlefield Bridges in Inman, South Carolina. He worked for Haverty Furniture Stores for 20 years and managed Haverty Furniture Stores in Chattanooga, Tennessee, and New Orleans, Louisiana. Mr. and Mrs. Bridges owned and operated Bridges' Furniture located at 416 Congress Ave. in Austin from 1946 until 1966.

With the closing of Bridges' Furniture, Mr. Bridges devoted his full energies to Marbridge. At his death, Mr. Bridges was Chairman Emeritus of Marbridge Foundation, Inc.

Marbridge was founded in a small ranch house on 80 acres in Manchaca. Today Marbridge encompasses 300 acres, three residential communities for more than 200 adults with cognitive challenges, as well as the Marbridge Garden Center, in Manchaca. Since its opening in 1953, Marbridge has provided long-term residential care and training to more than 2,000 adults with cognitive challenges.

Mr. Bridges was a longtime member and former deacon at 1st Baptist Church of Austin. At his death he was a member of Woodlawn Baptist Church in Austin. Mr. Bridges was a member of the Ben Hur Shrine Temple of Austin; a past Commissioner of the Manchaca Volunteer Fire Department; and a member of Manchaca Optimists. He was a charter member and former President of the Texas Association of Retarded Children, past Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Austin Travis County MHMR Center, in 1982 co-recipient, with his wife, of the American Association on Mental Deficiency Special Award, given by the American Association on Mental Retardation, and recognized as one of 10 outstanding citizens in 1987 by the Counseling and Pastoral Care of Austin.

Marbridge's 'guardian angel' took adults with disabilities under wing

For more than 50 years, Marjorie "Marge" Bridges aided thousands of adults with learning disabilities at the ranch that she and her husband co-founded for the benefit of their son who had mental retardation.

Bridges, who also lived at Marbridge, the 300-acre ranch in Manchaca on Austin's southwestern edge, died there Tuesday. She was 96.

"She was a guardian angel for adults who need and depend upon the kindness of others," said her nephew, Bob Fullbright, president and chairman of the nonprofit Marbridge Foundation.

Bridges' husband of 74 years, J.E. "Ed" Bridges, died at the ranch in 2001. Their son, Jim Bridges, 76, still lives there.

Marge Bridges was born in 1908 in Whitepath, a small town in the mountains of north

central Georgia. She and her husband founded and operated Bridges Furniture Co., at 416 Congress Ave., from 1946 until they sold it in 1966 to devote full time to the foundation that they created in 1953.

It began as a working, 87-acre ranch for boys who needed an alternative to the mental institutions of the day. Its name derived from her names, Marge and Bridges.

Through the years, it expanded, offering training in job skills such as horticultural, landscaping, farming and computers.

Today, more than 300 people

reside on the Marbridge campus that comprises three communities — the ranch, Mabee Village and Villa Nursing and Rehabilitation. There is also a summer camp.

Thousands of area gardeners have purchased plants at the Marbridge Garden Center, whose employees are residents of the campuses.

The family will receive friends from 2 to 4 p.m. today at Weed Corley-Fish Funeral Home, 3125 N. Lamar Blvd. Funeral services are Thursday in the ranch's chapel, 2310 Bliss Spillar Road, Manchaca.

The foundation maintains a Web site at www.marbridge.org with information about tuition and admission.

"Ed and Marge Bridges were truly leaders in the movement away from institutions and toward community and training facilities," Fullbright said.

Overstreet was 25, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. She had lived in San Benito, Texas in 1935. They had 2 children: Milton P., 3; and Martha E., 1. Both children had been born in Texas.
