## Community Services Block Grant Programmatic/Financial Report November 14, 2017

The Community Services Block Grant funds the delivery of services to low income Texas residents in all 254 counties. These funds support a variety of direct services in addition to helping maintain the core administrative elements of community action agencies.

For the City of Austin, the grant provides funding for the delivery of basic needs, case management, preventive health and employment support services through the City's six (6) Neighborhood Centers and the three (3) Outreach Sites.

- Basic Needs (food, clothing, information and referral, notary services, transportation, school supplies, car safety education and car seats, tax preparation, Blue Santa applications, fans, Thanksgiving food baskets and other seasonal activities);
- Preventive Health (screenings for blood pressure, blood sugar, and cholesterol; pregnancy testing; health promotion presentations, coordination and participation in health fairs, immunizations, coordination of wellness activities, linkages to medical home providers);
- Case Management (individual/family support counseling, advocacy, self-sufficiency case management, crisis intervention, linkages with employers, educational opportunities and training, and working with individuals on quality of life issues);
- Employment Support (intake, assessment and goal setting, job readiness training, job placement assistance, and job retention services)

- <u>2018 CSBG Budget</u> The President's initial 2018 budget eliminates funding for the Community Services Block Grant. Congress recently passed a Continuing Resolution that keeps funding levels the same until December 8 at this time it looks as if another Continuing Resolution may be passed before Congress takes final action on the 2018 budget. Meanwhile, the House Appropriations Committee approved their version of the FY2018 Labor-HHS bill which cut CSBG from \$715 million to \$607.5 million. The Senate Appropriations Labor-HHS bill cut CSBG by \$15 million to \$700 billion. CSBG has supported 16 of the 35 staff positions at the Neighborhood Centers, along with rent and utility assistance and other direct assistance such as bus passes.
- <u>CDC By-laws</u> The CDC's recommended updates were reviewed by the City Council's Audit and Finance Committee on August 22, 2017. We continue to work with Law, the City Clerk's office and NHCD to take these updates to the full Council for approval.
- 3. <u>Blackland Neighborhood Center</u> A new Manager has been hired and starts on November 13, 2017. Her name is Shameka Hodge-Holland.
- 4. **<u>FY16 Audit</u>** The City's audit firm has completed the audit a copy is posted in the backup. There are no findings for CSBG.
- <u>12th Annual Thanksgiving Lunch</u> The Rosewood-Zaragosa Neighborhood Center will be hosting this luncheon on Saturday, November 18, 2017 between 11 am and 1 pm, courtesy of the Mt. Carmel Lodge. It is free and open to the public. We hope you can join us.
- <u>Blue Santa</u> The Neighborhood Centers partner with the Austin Police Department each year to take applications for Christmas assistance through the Blue Santa program.
