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
# Results of 2017 Austin/Travis County Annual Count of People Experiencing Homelessness

Between 2:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. on Saturday January 28, 2017, over 500 volunteers counted the number of children, families and adults experiencing homelessness sleeping outdoors without shelter. Volunteers counted people in cars, tents, parks, under bridges, and on the streets. That same night, staff at agencies operating shelters and transitional housing programs counted persons staying sheltered. This combined effort is called the Point in Time Count and is a requirement from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for communities receiving HUD funds.

#### **Main Results:**

2,036 PEOPLE COUNTED HOMELESS In Austin/Travis County from 2-9 AM on January 28, 2017					
834	Outdoors	In cars, tents, parks, under bridges, and on the streets.			
832	In Shelters and Safe Havens	Shelters are usually full every night. Some use a lottery system because more people want shelter than there is space for them. People staying in shelters often sleep on the floor and have to return to the streets with their belongings before 7:00 a.m.			
370	In Transitional Housing	These programs offer time-limited housing and services to help people address issues that make it hard to maintain stable housing, such as fleeing domestic violence. HUD considers this category homeless because they will still need permanent housing.

# **Subpopulations**

- Total persons counted experiencing chronic homelessness in 2017 was 553, compared with 736 in 2016

   a 28% reduction.
- Total adults with a substance use disorder in 2017 was 345, compared with 188 in 2016 an 84% increase.



Figure 1. Unsheltered Persons by City Council District, Counted on January 27, 2017









### **Point-in-Time Count Numbers in Context:**

- The number of persons counted experiencing homelessness during the Point in Time Counts is only one of the numbers our community uses to understand our progress in ending community homelessness.
- We know at least 7,000+ persons experience homelessness over the course of a year in Austin/Travis County. Since 2015, ECHO has led the community in conducting assessments to understand their needs. - Austin's homelessness population is most visibly concentrated downtown:
   on a given night, 472 persons sleep at the ARCH and the Salvation Army (downtown
   shelters) while 178 persons sleep in the surrounding streets for a total of 650 persons
   waking up downtown homeless.
- The decrease in chronic homelessness is connected to the fact our community is prioritizing to serve the most vulnerable including persons with disabilities who have been living in the streets for a long time. Working together as a system, non-profits are using a shared database (Homeless Management Information System) for referral and tracking client's outcomes.
