Ballet East Dance Company has used the metrics used by the National Endowment for the Arts, the Texas Commission on the Arts and the City of Austin Cultural Arts Division for the last 30 years. They do not require organizations to maintain certain statistics such as per this instrument. Ballet East maintains an audience survey that predominately asks for zip codes, audience numbers, email addresses and any suggestions. All of our classes are provided free of charge to the community at large. We provide quality instructors/artists. Ballet East Dance Company seeks to build a structured and exciting cultural program at Metz Recreation Center by using dance/theater as a median toward community development. We are anticipating that 50 students will participate in the Cultural Program in the first year. By the end of the funding period, we expect to see significant improvement in the attitudes of participating

students toward school, as well as better grades and attendance and fewer disciplinary problems. In addition to the academic goals indicated in the previous sentence, we also expect to see them acquire greater movement and dance skills, stage etiquette, team work and joy in performance.

Ballet East has long felt that young people on Austin's East Side need cultural programs of structured activity in a safe environment. Both parents and older siblings work in most East Side families, leaving younger members without guidance and protection. Young people who find themselves at loose ends during non-school hours can lose motivation, gravitate toward group mischief or attach themselves to gangs from a simple desire not to be alone, to belong, and to have something to do. With stretched-thin budgets, schools have cut the cultural programs that are thought to be "extra" and many will close their doors to any cultural programming to save money. The experience of Ballet East suggests that cultural programs, far from being accessories, can be vital to academic success and individual growth.

A program that gives students opportunities to perform and shine as they acquire discipline helps them learn that they can succeed. When they are taken to museums and attend stage shows, students begin to see that arts and culture are not foreign and distant, but accessible.

Students in the cultural programs of Ballet East Dance Company are 80% Hispanic and 92% economically disadvantaged. The cultural program concentrates on elementary and middle school students, where the decision is often made to drop out and incorporates elements known to work with at-risk students. The dropout rate for East Austin schools hovered at nearly 50% for several years, but has been improving in recent years, due to concerted effort by the schools and community. Ballet East is part of this effort, with nearly all its middle and high schools students graduate from high school and continue on the university.

Minority families, 84% of whom are Hispanic/Latino (the Census Bureau's classification), occupy Austin East Side. Nearly a quarter (24%) was born in a foreign country, and 67% speak a language other than English at home. The mean household income is half that of Austin and United States in general. About 40% of this neighborhood is considered "working poor" and 27% of households fall below the poverty level. Austin has the greatest racial inequality in household income among comparable cities in the United States. School-age children (kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade) make up 27% of the population (the Austin average is 16%). The limited economic means of these students and families, continuous displacement and their limited proficiency in English are risk factors for dropping out of school and community.

Another issue prevalent to minority communities is the ever increasing problem of obesity. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the prevalence of obesity between 2014- 2016 was higher among Hispanics (21.9 percent and non-Hispanic blacks (19.5 percent) than among non-Hispanic whites (14.7 percent). Obesity persists into adulthood for 70 percent of obese adolescents. This incurs the risk of serious medical problems, including high blood pressure, Type 2 diabetes. coronary heart disease, colorectal cancer, and other lifespan reducing chronic illnesses.

Austin schools and community centers in traditionally underserved communities see the same trend of obese and overweight youth, including Latinos. This goal of this project is to utilize dance instruction as a means of encouraging good exercise habits, with warm ups, core strengthening, and cool downs. Additionally, the project will expose participants (40-50) to information from a nutritional and dietician/chef to inform them about good nutrition and healthy diets for long-term benefits.

From September to May, Ballet East will bring in four specialists to communicate information to the students about exercise, nutrition, and general health, and encourage students to set health goals for themselves, and identify the means to achieve them.

This will occur in the context of learning new dances to perform in May. Students in the Ballet East pilot program last year exploring health consciousness identified strength and stamina as their principal concerns.
