HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION AUGUST 27, 2018 DEMOLITION AND RELOCATION PERMITS HDP-2018-0385 1604 AND 1604-B E. 4th Street

PROPOSAL

Demolish two houses: a ca. 1926 front house and a ca. 1940 rear house.

ARCHITECTURE

The front house is a one-story, rectangular-plan, pyramidal hipped-roof board-and-batten house with a partial-width inset porch on square wood posts; single 1:1 fenestration. The rear house is a one-story, rectangular-plan, front-gabled, modified Cumberland-style duplex house with a partial-width shed-roofed independent porch on plain square wood posts; single 1:1 fenestration.

RESEARCH

The front house dates from around 1926; the rear duplex dates from the winter of 1939-1940. Both houses are located across the street from the historic home of Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church, an African-American congregation, and both had tenants tied to the identity of the neighborhood as an African-American and Mexican-American area of the city. The earliest tenants of the front house were a Mexican-American couple, Ricardo and Maria Santa Ana. Ricardo Santa Ana was a farm laborer in Bastrop and Caldwell counties, Texas before moving into this house. He and Maria lived here until around 1928. The tenants of the front house then seem to have alternated between African-American and Mexican-American families; very few had occupations listed in the city directories of the time.

Around 1936, the property was purchased by Sam Azar and his Syrian-born wife, Latifa, as a rental property. In the winter of 1939-1940, they constructed the rear house as a duplex, and continued to rent out all the units on the property. Their tenants included more Mexican-American and African-American families; Grace Beams, an African-American employee of Sam Azar at his Hong Kong Café on E. 6th Street, was the renter of the front house in the late 1940s. The longest-term tenants were Otis and Beulah Craft, who lived here from around 1950 to around 1962. Otis Craft had a variety of jobs, including construction worker, laborer, and elevator operator.

STAFF COMMENTS

Both houses are listed in the East Austin Historic Survey (2016); neither was recommended for designation or for inclusion in a potential historic district.


Staff has evaluated the houses for designation as historic landmarks, and has determined that the front house may have architectural significance as a vernacular board-and-batten rent house, but does not retain sufficient integrity or historical significance to warrant individual designation as a historic landmark. The back house has no architectural or historical associations worthy of commemoration with a landmark designation, as defined in City Code:


a. **Architecture.** The front house is a small, board-and-batten frame house which was once very common in blue-collar neighborhoods in the city, and still remain in sufficient number in other sections of East Austin (primarily north of 7th Street). The back house is a frame duplex with double front doors that approximate the Cumberland Style but are off-center in a way that defies the

- typical configuration of the style. Neither house exhibits any features of architectural distinction.
- b. **Historical association**. Both houses were rental properties with a high turnover of tenants over the years. Both houses had Mexican-American and African-American tenants. There do not appear to be significant historical associations.
- c. **Archaeology**. The house was not evaluated for its potential to yield significant data concerning the human history or prehistory of the region.
- d. **Community value**. The house does not possess a unique location, physical characteristic, or significant feature that contributes to the character, image, or cultural identity of the city, the neighborhood, or a particular demographic group.
- e. **Landscape feature**. The property is not a significant natural or designed landscape with artistic, aesthetic, cultural, or historical value to the city.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Encourage rehabilitation and adaptive re-use, then relocation over demolition, but release the permit upon completion of a City of Austin Documentation Package, consisting of photographs of all elevations, a dimensioned sketch plan, and a narrative history, for archiving at the Austin History Center. These houses do not meet the criteria for individual designation as historic landmarks.



BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Ricardo and Maria Santa Ana (ca. 1925 – ca. 1928)

The 1920 U.S. Census shows Ricardo and Maria Santa Ana living in a rented farmhouse in Bastrop County, Texas. Ricardo Santa Ana was 21, had been born in Texas to Mexican-born parents, and was a farmer. Maria Santa Ana was 18, had been born in Texas to Mexican-born parents, and had no occupation listed. They had 2 daughters: Eliza, 1; and Isabel, an infant. Both girls had been born in Texas.

His 1918 World War I draft registration card shows that Ricardo Santono [sic] was living at Cedar Creek in Bastrop County. He was born in 1899 and was a resident alien. He was a farm laborer for a farm near Lockhart, Texas. His nearest relative was his wife, Maria Aleman Santana. He was tall with a medium build and brown eyes and black hair.

1930 U.S. Census

The 1930 U.S. Census shows Katrina Rayell and 5 children as the renters of this house. Katrina Rayell was 32, had been born in Mexico, and was a laundress at home. Her children, al of whom had been born in Texas, were Eugenia, 13; Alfredo, 12; Anita, 10; Guadalupe, 7; and Domingo, 6.

Also at this address were Joe and Mary Marcial, both of whom had been born in Mexico. Joe Marcial was a 32-year old truck driver for the State Highway Department. Mary Marcial, 33, had no occupation listed.

1940 U.S. Census

The 1940 U.S. Census shows Leslie Carl Wagner and his wife, Lucille as the renters of the front house and Jessie and John Esther Donovan as the renters of one side of the back duplex and Sam and Frances Wells as the renters of the other side of the back duplex. Leslie Carl Wagner was white 34 years old, and a Texas-born plumber for an electrical company. Lucille Wagner was white, 35, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. In the back duplex, Jesse and John Esther Donovan were African-American. He was 26, had been born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. She was 21, had been born in Texas, and was a maid for a private family. On the other side of the duplex were Sam and Frances Wells. He was a 41-year old Texas-born independent truck driver; she was 24, had been born in Texas, and was a cook at the School for the Deaf (most likely the school for African-American deaf children out on Bull Creek Road).

Otis and Beulah Mae Craft (ca. 1950 – ca. 1962)

Otis Craft appears in the 1940 U.S. Census as the 17-year old son of Sam and Emma Craft, who rented their home at 1706 E. 5th Street in Austin. Otis was born in Texas and had no occupation shown in the census report. He was the oldest of Sam and Emma's 3 children listed. Sam Craft, 62, was born in Texas, and had no occupation listed. Emma Craft, 54, had been born in Texas and was a laundress at home. No other family member had an occupation listed. Sam and Emma Craft also had 4 of their grandchildren living in the house, none of whom had the last name of Craft.

Beulah Mae Craft was born Feb.13, 1927 in Austin, Texas to the late Wiley Moore and Mary Ella Hawkins. She attended the Austin Public School System and was a homemaker. Services will be held May 18th at Fontaine Memorial Baptist church. Burial in Evergreen Cemetery. Information from the Find-A-Grave website. Similar information was published in the Austin American-Statesman, May 14, 2006

Sam and Latifa Azar, the owners of this property from around 1936 at least through the late 1960s.

Sam G. and Latifa Azar appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of a house worth \$1,300 at 1007 E. 7th Street in Austin. Sam G. Azar was 40, had been born in Texas, and was the operator of a beer garden. Latifa Azar was 40, had been born in Syria, and was an assistant at the beer garden. They had 2 children: Gladys, 17; and George, 13. Both children had been born in Texas, and neither had an occupation shown. The Azar family lived in Brenham, Texas in 1935. As an aside, the Azar family lived next door to another Lebanese family, Fred and Isabel Jabour, who for many years operated Freddie's Place a beer tavern on E. 6th Street. At the time of the 1940 census, however, Fred Jabour was a 25-year old clerk in his father's dry goods business.

Latifa Azar died in 1946 from Hodgkins' Disease. She was born in 1903 in Syria, and her race is listed as "Syrian" on her death certificate. She was living at 1007 E. 7th Street in Austin at the time of her death, and was a housewife.

Sam Azar's 1978 death certificate shows that he was living at 5003 Wasson Road at the time of his death. He was born in 1898 in Houston, Texas, and was the owner of a restaurant.

MRS. LAITFA AZAR

Mrs. Laitfa Azar died at a local hospital Saturday afternoon. She is survived by her husband, Sam George Azar; one daughter, Miss Gladys Azar; one son, George Azar, all of Austin; and one sister, Mrs. Louis Kaleel of Houston.

The body is at Cook Funeral Home pending completion of funeral arrangements.




