### WHAT DID NOT PASS

- No legislation passed affecting:
  - School finance
  - School choice
  - Bathrooms/LGBT
  - Franchise tax reductions
  - Medical marijuana
  - Higher education funding/tuition



### WHAT DID NOT PASS


- **HB 1215** (Johnson, E.) Relating to the inclusion of an incarcerated person in the population data used for redistricting according to the person's last residence before incarceration.
- **HB 3698** (Isaac) Relating to the ineligibility of certain governmental entities that prohibit or discourage the enforcement of immigration laws to participate in and receive funds from the major events reimbursement program.
- SB 1487 (West) Relating to preventing racial profiling and video and audio equipment and recordings of certain law enforcement motor vehicle stops; creating an offense.
- HJR 74 (Anchia) Proposing a constitutional amendment establishing the Texas Redistricting Commission to redistrict the Texas Legislature and Texas congressional districts and revising procedures for redistricting.



### WHAT PASSED

- **HB 22** (Huberty) Relating to public school accountability. (effective 6/15/17)
- **HB 3051** (King, Phil) / **SB 1747** (Hinojosa) Relating to the categories used to record the race or ethnicity of persons stopped for or convicted of traffic offenses. (effective 9/1/17)
- SB 4 (Perry) Relating to the enforcement by campus police departments and certain local governmental entities of state and federal laws governing immigration and to related duties and liability of certain persons in the criminal justice system; providing a civil penalty; creating a criminal offense. (effective 9/1/17)
  - Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals reinstated key provisions that were temporarily blocked by a federal district judge:
    - Law enforcement agencies are required to comply with, honor and fulfill any federal immigration detainer request that adheres with existing federal practice and law
    - However, the court interpreted the provision as not requiring detention pursuant to every federal detainer request; "leaves the door open" for a law enforcement agency to refuse to honor a detainer request.


