## Community Services Block Grant Programmatic/Financial Report September 11, 2018

The Community Services Block Grant funds the delivery of services to low income Texas residents in all 254 counties. These funds support a variety of direct services in addition to helping maintain the core administrative elements of community action agencies.

For the City of Austin, the grant provides funding for the delivery of basic needs, case management, preventive health and employment support services through the City's six (6) Neighborhood Centers and the three (3) Outreach Sites.

- Basic Needs (food, clothing, information and referral, notary services, transportation, school supplies, car safety education and car seats, tax preparation, Blue Santa applications, fans, Thanksgiving food baskets and other seasonal activities);
- **Preventive Health** (screenings for blood pressure, blood sugar, and cholesterol; pregnancy testing; health promotion presentations, coordination and participation in health fairs, immunizations, coordination of wellness activities, linkages to medical home providers);
- Case Management (individual/family support counseling, advocacy, self-sufficiency case management, crisis intervention, linkages with employers, educational opportunities and training, and working with individuals on quality of life issues);
- **Employment Support** (intake, assessment and goal setting, job readiness training, job placement assistance, and job retention services)

- 2019 CSBG Budget Although the President's Budget zeroed out CSBG, both the House and the Senate Appropriations Committees recommended funding CSBG. The Senate bill funds CSBG at \$725 million, a \$10 million increase from FY 2018. The House released its FY 2019 bill which funded CSBG at \$749 million, an increase of \$35 million over FY 2018. TDHCA released its initial estimated funding allocations which holds the City of Austin at level funding from its final 2018 allocation at \$1,102,106.
- TDHCA Monitoring Visit The final results of the monitoring visit will be shared with members of the Community Development Commission when they are received. Initial feedback from the exit meeting indicated the only deficiency will be based on the previous finding related to the CDC bylaws, which had not been resolved at the time of the visit.
- 3. <u>CDC By-laws</u> –City Council approved the recommended changes to the bylaws at their August 30, 2018 meeting. A copy of the bylaws as adopted is provided in the back-up. Additional action must now be taken by Council to decide which Council committee or committees will be responsible for nominating members of the public and private sectors of the CDC going forward. Additional information and discussion on next steps will be held during the meeting.
- 4. <u>CDC Designated Geographic Areas</u> Updated information on the CDC Designated Geographic Areas is included in the back-up for consideration. Staff will provide additional information during the meeting in order for the Commission to consider next steps.
- 5. <u>Customer Service Survey</u> The bi-annual customer service survey was completed in July at the Neighborhood Centers and outreach locations. Information on the results of the survey is included in the back-up. Center Managers have reviewed and followed up with any clients who expressed concerns if contact information was provided.
- 2019 Community Action Plan and Budget A public hearing on the 2019 Community
  Action Plan and Budget will be scheduled in conjunction with the October, 2018
  Community Development Commission meeting.
